Mr. Henry Enser asked who is paying the salary of Mrs. James. Town Attorney Maxwell stated that the County of Erie pays the salary and the funds used are Federal Funds.

Mrs. Nancy Aldridge asked how many employees are in the Town Hall working under the CETA Program. Supervisor Stromecki reported there are two Senior Clerk-Typists and a Draftsman.

Mr. Enser asked what happened to the money that Mrs. James was getting. Supervisor Stromecki stated that he understood from Mr. Doering that the money goes back into the program and when the money is exhausted the program runs out. Mrs. Arlene James stated she felt this information was incorrect. Supervisor Stromecki stated that where the money goes is not his concern, but how the money is spent.

Mrs. Aldridge stated she felt the program was put into effect to employ people in need. Town Attorney Maxwell stated this is one of the purposes. Mrs. Aldridge noted that the person who was laid off was the one whose husband was unemployed and the others husbands were employed.

Supervisor Stromecki stated the reason for the termination was the Dispatchers were at full strength and CETA workers were not to replace people already employed. Mrs. James was working in the Police Department to clear up the backlog and take care of the filing.

Lt. Antos of the Police Department stated he was sure that the Supervisor had good intentions in what he had done, but would like to go on record for the Police Department, with no authority from his superior, that the Town Board should realize that there is a need for at least part time work in the Police Department Office to do paper work and filing which over the past years has been let slide. He stated help is needed to abide by the laws of CPS or DCJS and other agencies. He went on to say it was his personal opinion that the Police Department will take exception to this. Councilman Wittmeyer asked if in the three days they were without a secretary had they had help. Lt. Antos stated he was not sure. Supervisor Stromecki asked the Town Clerk if they had asked for and received secretarial help and he stated yes.

Councilman Kennedy stated that at the meeting on January 24 with the Police Department, there was discussion in regard to the Dispatchers not doing the work that had been correlated by the Board and that some of the Dispatching had been done by the Clerk-Typist. He further noted that for a time there were only two dispatchers and at that time Mrs. James started dispatching from the office. Supervisor Stromecki asked Lt. Antos if there was ever a vacancy in the dispatchers. Lt. Antos stated he could not recall and that the Clerk-Typist had taken over to relieve the dispatchers during the day to relieve the work load.

Supervisor Stromecki stated he could not state anything prior to his fiscal responsibility as Supervisor which took place on January 1.

Arlene James stated she took Mary Thomas's place and Jean Ruchalski would take the phone one night and Sue Hinkey the next and she was on during the day. Mrs. James noted this started on Primary day of 1975. She stated she was on for one month and after that was on her own and Mary Thomas was finished. Town Clerk Klein reported that there was one month when only two dispatchers were paid and Chief Hinkey asked the Board to take that third dispatchers monthly salary and divide it between the two and the Town Board went along with the Chief's recommendation as they were doing the work of three. Councilman Kennedy stated they assumed the two dispatchers had taken the work load, but evidently they had not.

A motion was made by Supervisor Stromecki and seconded by Councilman Wittmeyer to terminate the employment of Arlene James of the Town of Boston CETA Program and to ratify the act of the Supervisor in terminating such employee.

five (5) ayes

Carried

Councilman Kennedy stated that when people were hired under the CETA Program there was talk that it was only for one year, and there are provisions in the current budget for Clerk-Typists. He further noted that he concurred with the Supervisor's premise of fiscal responsibility in the utilization of the people we have. He stated CETA is a Federal program used to help in the time of unemployment and he felt some move should be made for fiscal responsibility on the Town level and Federal level.

Councilman Smolinski asked if there had been any other CETA jobs terminated. Supervisor Stromecki stated yes for almost identical reasons. Supervisor Stromecki read a letter he had sent to Mr. Doering terminating the employment of Mark Bolt effective January 2, 1976. A motion was made by Supervisor Stromecki and seconded by Councilman Kennedy to terminate the employment of Mark Bolt of the Town of Boston CETA Program as a laborer effective January 2, 1976 and to ratify this action taken by the Supervisor.

A personal letter was read by Supervisor Stromecki from Mark Bolt to the Supervisor.

Town Clerk Klein reported that at the January 7, 1976 organizational meeting the name of John Hinkey was incorrectly put on the Police Study Committee and it should have been Joseph Antos. Supervisor Stromecki stated that he had talked to Chief Hinkey and had advised him that if he wanted to remain on the committee he could. Chief Hinkey had advised him he wanted Joseph Antos to be on the Committee as originally planned. A motion was made by Supervisor Stromecki and seconded by Councilman Zimmerman that the name of John Hinkey be taken off the Police Study Committee and the name of Joseph Antos be added.

It was agreed upon by the Board that Town of Boston residents have first priority and Town Attorney Maxwell suggested each person desiring Bond Anticipation Notes be given a number and a drawing be held to determine who will be offered the notes.

A letter was read from the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation in regard to the Mined Land Reclamation Law. Also received was a Notice of Public Hearing and Rules and Regulations implementing the New York State Mined Land and Reclamation Law. Supervisor Stromecki asked that the law be sent to the Chairmen of the Conservation Advisory Council and Planning Board. Supervisor Stromecki stated he would be attending the Public Hearing and will report on this to the Board at the March meeting. The law was referred to Town Attorney Maxwell.

A letter was read from Congressman Henry Nowak thanking the Town Board for their letter of appreciation on his bill regarding Route 219. Supervisor Stromecki stated that the Route 219 Task Force had met in Yorkshire and made recommendations and now it was in Schuler's lap to make a recommendation. The letter was received and filed.

A letter was read from the Erie County Water Authority in regard to an increase in water rates. Supervisor Stromecki stated that the Village of Hamburg is going to the Erie County Water Authority for service and they must feel the new rate of \$1.11 is a bargain. He further stated that he hopes the Erie County Water Authority will carry on as economically as possible. The letter was received and filed.

A copy of a letter was read from Town Engineer Moncreiff to the United States Environmental Protection Agency in regard to self-monitoring requirements for the Town of Boston. Supervisor Stromecki stated that last fall new requirements were put into effect and a study showed it would cost the Town approximately \$2,000 per sewer district and therefore the Town Engineer had recommended that we come up with a more economical way to meet these requirements. Supervisor Stromecki further stated that Mr. Moncreiff had talked by telephone to the EPA and they had not said this method could be used or could not be used so this letter was written seeking approval. Councilman Kennedy stated he felt the requirements were meant for large sewer districts not our small system. The letter was received and filed.

A letter was read from Carolyn Shadle requesting her name be considered for the Conservation Advisory Council if any vacancies should arise. Supervisor Stromecki stated this would be put with other requests. The letter was received and filed.

Mildred Dolce asked that a stop or yield sign be placed at the corner of Rice Road and Back Creek Road as a dangerous situation exists in the area; that the drive-in mail box at the Boston Post Office be made free of snow as it is impossible to reach from your car or out of the car; that reflector lights be placed at the entrances to the Town Hall and that the trees at Back Creek and Rice Road be cut or trimmed. Supervisor Stromecki asked Highway Superintendent Kreitzbender to look into a sign for the intersection. Supervisor Stromecki stated he would call Mrs. Drankhan the Boston Postmaster in regard to the mailbox, and he asked that the Traffic Safety Committee look into the matter of the trees and if possibly they are in violation of the clear-site ordinance.

There was discussion in regard to lights on the entrance of the expressway and it

was noted that no lights can be placed until the expressway is completed.

Nina Plewik questioned the newspaper articles on the termination of the employment of Arlene James, a CETA worker. She asked if the Supervisor had the power to hire and fire and Supervisor Stromecki stated yes. She asked if Mrs. James job was due to be finished now or if it would have continued until April. Supervisor Stromecki stated he did not know for sure and at the time he became Supervisor he felt studies had to be made as it didn't matter if it was Town, State or Federal money, if financial status showed the job unnecessary it should be terminated. Mrs. Nina Plewik stated she felt a ten minute notice was unfair and Mrs. James had gotten a raw deal. Supervisor Stromecki stated that other people had been laid off as there wasn't sufficient work to keep them. Councilman Kennedy stated the work in the Police Department had been brought up to date and she was doing the job of dispatcher during the day at \$3.80 an hour while the regular dispatchers were receiving \$.60 per hour. Councilman Wittmeyer stated at a meeting with Chief Hinkey he asked what would be done if the CETA program ended and Chief Hinkey stated that he would need help at least two days a week. Councilman Wittmeyer stated he is getting Clerical help from the girls upstairs. Supervisor Stromecki stated while he is in office he will not balloon the payroll and he believed the Federal Government should subsidize private industry and not get in the employment business.

Clive Rucker stated equipment was needed to run tests in the Sewer District #4. Supervisor Stromecki ask that he submit a letter to him with the requests.

Paul Bolt complimented Supervisor Stromecki on the action taken in regard to his son as he felt it was not good practice to keep someone on the payroll when there wasn't any work.

A check was received from Mr. Oscar Smuckler of the Boston Hills Trailer Court in the amount of \$1,600.00 for sixty-four (64) trailers at \$25.00 per unit. Town Clerk Klein reported that he had not received payment from Mr. Stanley Czesak of Sprague's Trailer Park. Supervisor Stromecki asked that a letter be sent to Mr. Czesak requesting the license fee and that the Codification Committee study the possibility of adding a clause to the trailer ordinance in regard to late charges. Supervisor Stromecki stated that he would be meeting with the Town Engineer and Town Attorney during the week to set up a cash flow plan.

Supervisor Stromecki reported on the meeting between the Town Board and Joseph Terrizzi regarding Cable TV. He stated that Mr. Terrizzi had been asked to continue as the Town's representative for Cable TV and had been requested to send a letter of introduction to the International Cable Company. Supervisor Stromecki explained how Cable TV could be brought to Boston and the cost to each subscriber.

Supervisor Stromecki reported that he had attended a meeting in regard to Community Development Money and approval has been given for \$15,864 for Water District #2. He further stated he had also attended a hearing of the State Environmental Review Act and most of the people who spoke were against the Review Act as vague and cumbersome and there are so many Environmental laws on the book now that there should be no further need for Environmental laws.

Supervisor Stromecki reported that the Bicentennial newsletter has been printed and will be distributed by the Boy Scouts and volunteers.

A fact sheet in regard to the Southtowns Sewers was read by Supervisor Stromecki. He noted a Public Hearing will be held on February 19, 1976 at the Erie County Legislature Chambers and that he would attend. There was discussion in regard to the Federal aid for the Laterals and interceptors.

Supervisor Stromecki reported that at a meeting of the Southtowns Supervisor's there have been discussions on dog problems and each Supervisor felt it would be a good idea to have a County Dog Pound. He went on to say that he had met with Supervisor Fallon of Hamburg and they are initiating a plan to issue summons to dog owners the same way as traffic summons are issued. He noted that this will be for dogs running loose and the dog warden will have to see the dog in order to issue the summons.

Councilman Smolinski reported that a meeting of the Boston Youth Baseball was held. He noted it was the first meeting of 1976 and officers were elected for the year. He further stated that there will be another meeting with the Recreation Director on Monday night to get the plans underway for 1976.

Supervisor Stromecki reported that Councilman Wittmeyer had met with the Conservation Advisory Council and Councilman Kennedy had met with the Planning Board and he anticipated that the full Board would be meeting with these committees in the near future.

Mr. Decker asked how you would get dimensions when you have six acres. LOCAL LAW NUMBER 1 OF 1976
ADOPTED MARCH 3, 1976

A Local Law relating to the excavation, removal and storage of earth, sand, gravel and other similar materials in the Town of Boston, New York.

Be it enacted by the Town Board of the Town of Boston as follows:

Section A - No excavation, removal, or storage of earth, sand, gravel, rock, topsoil, minerals or other similar material (excluding wood), other than the excavation, removal or storage necessary in connection with the construction of buildings, residences, structures, retaining walls, fences, private drives, parking lots, ponds, public improvements and public or private utilities, or the storage of materials by a building supply business or in conjunction with normal farming or agricultural operations and provided such material not be removed from the agricultural property shall be commenced in the Town of Boston, except in conformity with the provisions of this Local Law.

Section B - Before commencing the excavation, removal or storage of any of the materials mentioned in Section A, the owner or lessee of such premises or tract of land shall obtain a written permit therefore, to be issued by the Town Clerk of the Town of Boston only after the approval by the Town Board of the Town of Boston, which approval shall be at the discretion of said Town Board.

Section C - The applicant shall file with the Town Clerk of the Town of Boston a signed application, in duplicate, on application forms, to be supplied by the Town, showing the following:

(1) Location of premises and location and extent of the proposed excavation showing lot line dimensions of the entire parcel and exact dimensions and location of the area proposed to be excavated.

(2) Drainage systems to be installed to insure proper surface drainage during and after completion of the work; provided, however, where the excavation proposed shall be less than 2500 cubic yards, then this requirement shall be waived.

(3) A statement setting forth the amount of cubic yards of material proposed to be excavated.

(4) Location of all existing buildings on said premises and distances from area proposed to be excavated.

(5) The depth from existing soil conditions proposed to be excavated.

(6) The proposed surface texture of ground cover to be installed upon completion of the excavation.

(7) Such further detail and information as may be requested and included on application forms that may be material and necessary to evaluate the application.

Section D - No such excavation or stock piles arising therefrom shall be made within 50 feet of the right-of-way of any public road, street, highway or public area or within 50 feet of any property line of adjoining land unless written consent of the adjoining property owner shall be first obtained and a duplicate or original copy attached to the application and unless said front-line or side-line limitations are waived by the Town Board. No slope shall exceed 25% grade upon completion of the excavation.

Section E - Surface texture or ground cover for each removal may consist of one or more of the following:

A. Completely seeded with grass cover to prevent erosion upon the completion of the excavation; provided, however, that where practical difficulties, continuing operations or seasonal conditions prevent or impede the installation of ground cover, the installation of same may be deferred but only upon the special approval of the Town Board and upon such special conditions, as it may determine.

B. Any type of landscaping or site improvement which will prevent erosion, subject to approval both by the Town Board and the Town Engineer.

The surface of all excavated or disturbed areas shall have a positive slope not less than one (1%) per cent or more than three (3%) per cent to existing drainage facilities and the surface texture of all such areas shall be of such a nature as to prevent erosion of the surface after all

excavation has been performed and completed. The proposed grading and slope and the necessary auxiliary appurtenances shall provide adequate drainage to existing Town facilities as shall be approved by the Town Engineer before removal operations are commenced.

Access roadways and drives, if any, shall be watered or protectively surfaced to prevent dust and to eliminate drawing any accumulation of dirt, grit or stone onto the highway during the progress of the excavation.

Section F. The applicant shall pay a fee of not less than \$50.00 before any permit or renewal thereof may be issued for any application pursuant to this local law where said application or renewal of a permit shall be for one acre or less of lands to be excavated. Where said application or renewal for the excavation of land shall be in excess of one acre the fee to be paid by the applicant shall be an additional \$10.00 per acre or proportion thereof of lands proposed to be excavated.

Regardless of when such permit or renewal thereof be granted, it shall expire on December 31st of the calendar year during which it is issued.

Section G. - Nothing herein contained shall require a person to obtain a permit for or prevent the moving of top soil and earth fill from one part of his premises or tract of land to another part of the same premises or tract of land when such is necessary for normal agricultural and farming operations of for regarding or improvement of said land; provided, however, that any person engaged in the development of areas known as "subdivisions" within the Town of Boston, and moving topsoil to correct grades shall replace topsoil so moved to a minimum depth of 4" compacted as existed thereon prior thereto.

Nothing herein contained shall prevent a cemetery from excavating for a grave, headstone, or monument and removing or storing the surplus dirt or material resulting from such excavation.

Section H - The words "person," "owner", "lessee," "applicant",

and/or "holder of a permit" as used herein shall apply to all individuals operating as sole proprietors, partnerships, firms, associations or corporations.

Section I - Notwithstanding any other provision of this Local Law, any excavation made within the Town of Boston which shall effect Town drainage facilities, water mains, sewer lines or streets shall be subject to the approval of the Town Engineer and Building Inspector, and no surface water or storm water shall be discharged directly into municipal facilities or drainage systems without the aforesaid approval.

Section J

(1) Any violation by a person, firm or corporation of any provision of this Local Law shall be deemed as offense punishable by a fine not to exceed Two Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250.00) or imprisonment for a period not to exceed six (6) months or both; provided, however, that for the purpose of conferring jurisdiction upon the courts and judicial officers generally, such violation shall be deemed a misdemeanor and for such purpose only all provisions of law relating to misdemeanors shall apply to such violations.

(2) Any person who takes part in or assists in any violation of this Local Law shall also be subject to the penalties provided herein.

(3) Each day that a violation of this Local Law is committed or is permitted to exist shall constitute a separate offense.

Section K - Where there are practical difficulties or unnecessary hardships in the way of carrying out the strict letter of this Local Law the Town Board of the Town of Boston shall have the power, in passing upon the original application or renewals required herein, to vary or modify any of the regulations or provisions contained herein so that the spirit of the Local Law shall be observed, public safety and welfare secured and substantial justice done.

Section M - If any section subdivision, paragraph or provision of this Local Law shall be adjudged by a court of competent jurisdiction to be

invalid, such adjudication shall apply only to such portion thereof so expressly adjudged invalid and the invalidity thereof shall not effect, impair or invalidate the remainder of the Local Law.

Section N - This law is to be effective upon its proper filing as required by law.

A letter was read from William E. Doering of Manpower Services advising that the termination date for CETA Employees was March 31, 1976 instead of April 2, 1976 as previously directed. The letter was received and filed.

A letter was read from E. W. Umiker, Commissioner of Public Works for Erie County advising the Town Board to keep an accurate record of expenses incurred during the ice storm. Supervisor Stromecki stated that he had met with Highway Superintendent Kreitzbender and the cost to the Highway Department is approximately \$12,000 and they are following the procedure as requested.

Section 1. The specific object or purpose for which the obligations are to be issued is payment of part of the cost of the purchase of one (1) 1975 International Truck Vehicle with Chassis and Cab by the Town of Boston, New York.

Section 2. The maximum estimated cost of such specific object or purpose is \$26,975.69 and the plan for the financing thereof is as follows:

- a) By the issuance of \$20,000 serial bonds of said Town, hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Finance Law and by the payment of the balance of said total cost in the amount of \$6,975. from current funds now available in the highway budget.

Section 3. It is hereby determined that the period of probably usefulness of the aforesaid specific object or purpose is at least 5 years, pursuant to subdivision 28 of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law. It is hereby further determined that the maximum maturity of the serial bonds herein authorized shall be four years.

Section 4. The faith and credit of said Town of Boston, Erie County, New York, are hereby irrevocably pledged to the payment of the principal of an interest on such bonds as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such bonds becoming due and payable in such year. There shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property within said Town of Boston a tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest on such bonds as the same become due and payable.

Section 5. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the serial bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Supervisor, the chief fiscal officer. Such notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Supervisor, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

Section 6. This resolution shall take effect immediately.

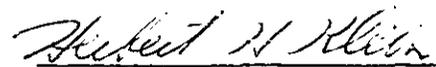

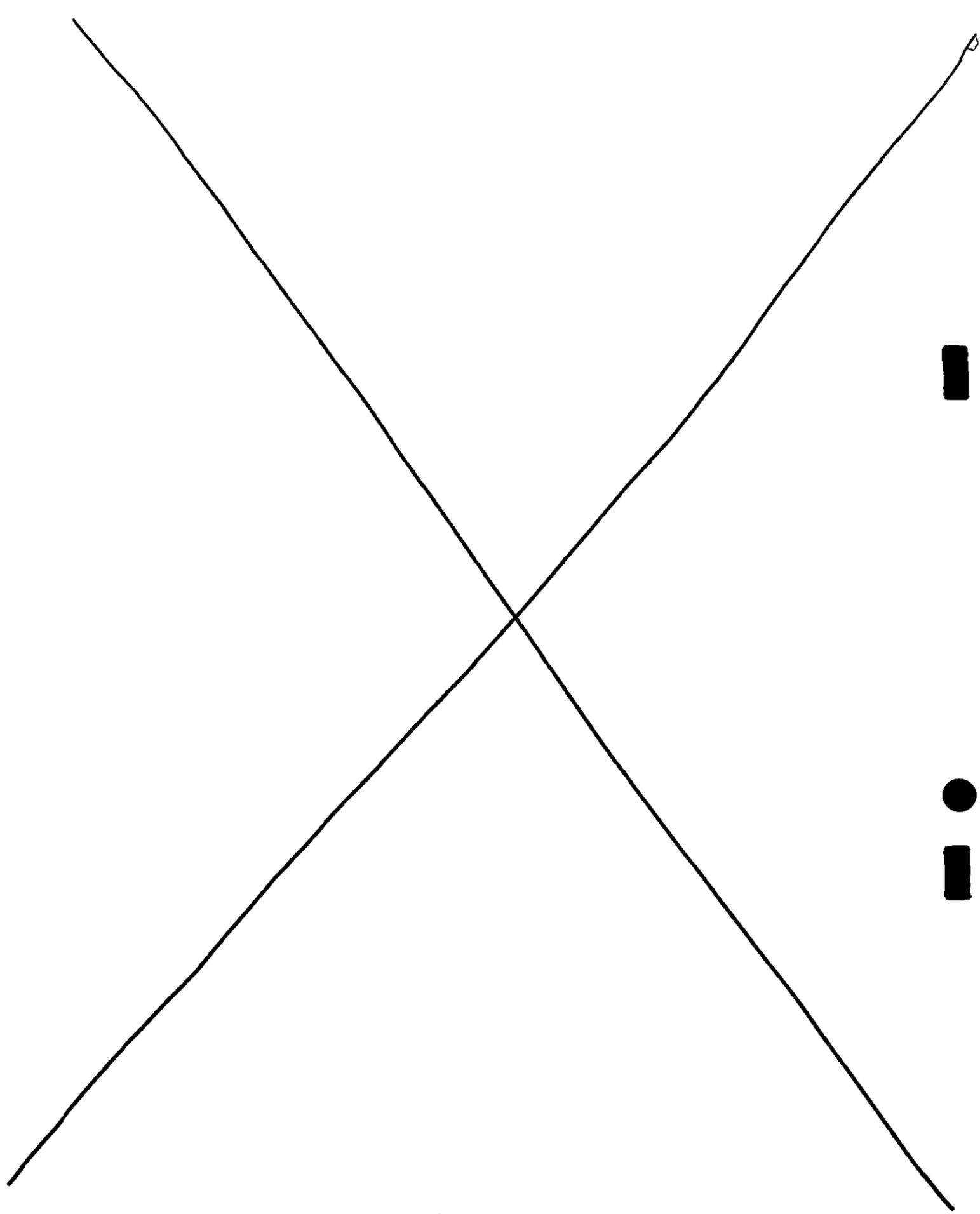

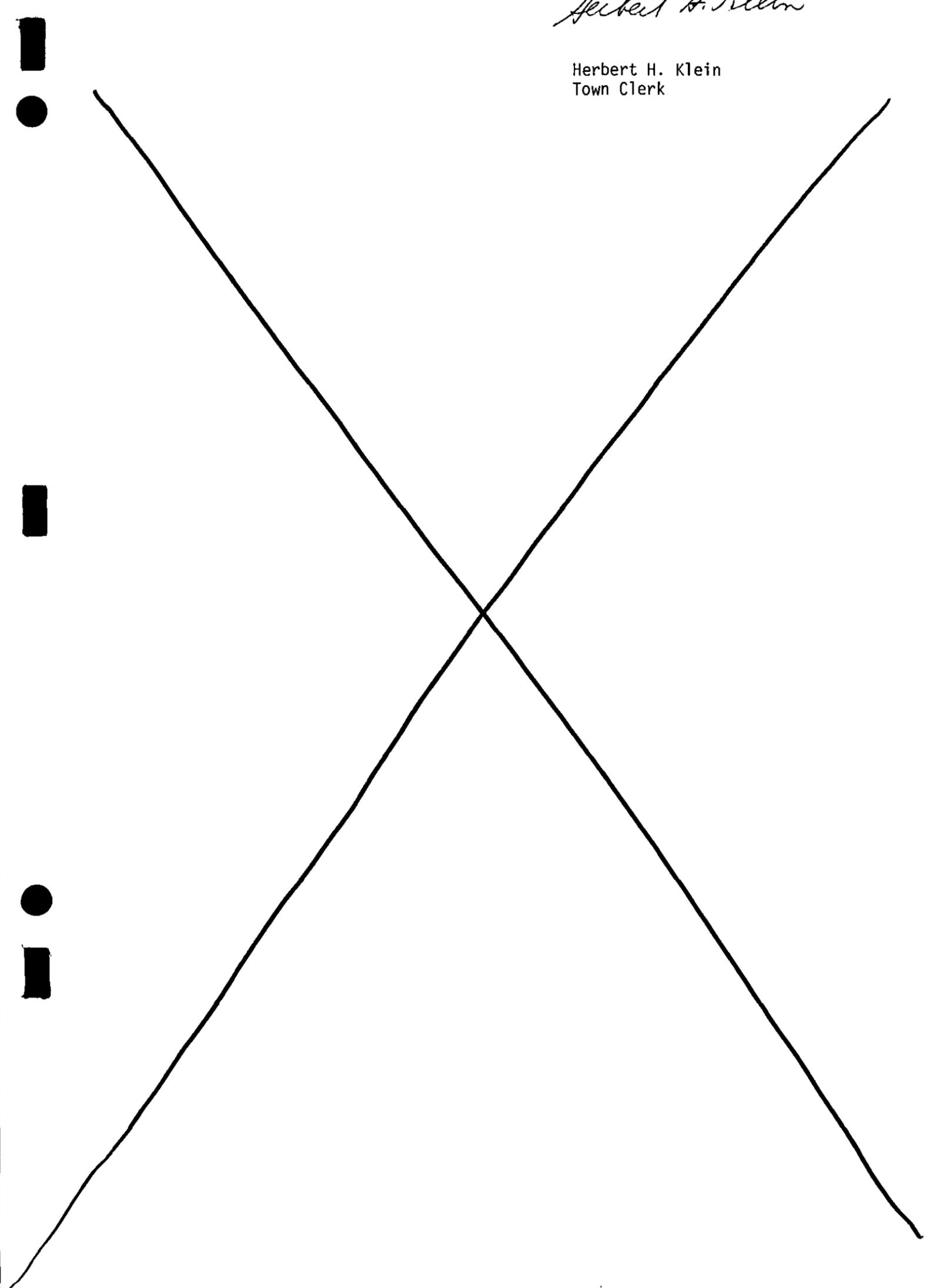

LOCAL LAW NUMBER 2 of 1976

Adopted June 2, 1976

A Local Law relating to the regulation and restriction upon the parking or standing of motor vehicles upon public properties owned by the Town of Boston, New York.

WHEREAS, pursuant to the provisions and the authority of Section 130 of the Town Law of the State of New York, the Town of Boston, Erie County, New York, may enact a Local Law, rules and regulations pertaining thereto, regulating the use and the restriction upon the parking or standing of motor vehicles and motorcycles upon such public places owned by the Town of Boston, Erie County, New York,

NOW, THEREFORE, be it enacted by the Town Board of the Town of Boston as follows:

Section A. - No person, firm or corporation shall allow the parking of or allow to stand, or cause to be parked any motor vehicles or motorcycle, owned or controlled by said person, firm or corporation upon the public land and property of the Town of Boston as is designated herein or hereafter designated by amendment to this Local Law.

Section B. - To effectuate the prohibition upon the parking or standing of a motor vehicle or motorcycle upon such public premises as hereafter specified, a conspicuous sign or signs shall be posted at such prohibited or restricted parking lot or parking area, informing the public as to the prohibited or restricted parking thereon. A sign, as hereinafter described, shall be deemed substantial compliance with this section.

POLICE ENFORCEMENT

Section C. - Such signs shall be at least 3 feet high by 4 feet wide, with red lettering of a size not less than above indicated, upon a white background. The words "Police Enforcement" and "Under Penalty of Law" shall be construed, among other things, to mean a request by the Town of Boston, as owner, that the police or special patrolmen shall enforce the provisions of this Section against persons parking, standing, storing, or leaving a vehicle or vehicles or motorcycle on such premises without the consent of the owner of said premises, and that the police are authorized to enter upon such premises to enforce the provisions of the Local Law. Such sign or signs shall state the conditions of parking or persons authorized by the owner to use said premises for parking, or both; and the persons not included within such authorization for violating the regulations and conditions set out on said signs shall be deemed to be using said premises unlawfully and without the authority and consent of the owner.

Section D. - This Section may be enforced by the police or special patrolmen for the enforcement of traffic or parking ordinances, including the use of tags, summonses and towing and any other procedures authorized by law.

Section E. - Proof of ownership of a vehicle shall be presumptive evidence in an action for enforcement of this Section that the owner parked or caused his vehicle to be parked on such premises.

Section F. - Lands of the Town of Boston hereby restricted and regulated, pursuant to the provisions of this Local Law, are as follows:

(1). A strip of land providing access to the Town of Boston Highway Building, Patchin, New York, which extends 20 feet from the northeast corner of the original old Town Hall, now occupied by the Boston Emergency Squad, Inc. thence running westerly along said 20 foot strip of land to the easterly right-of-way of Route 219.

Section G. - The words "Park," "Parking," or "Parked" shall mean the stopping of a motor vehicle or motorcycle upon the restricted regulated area, leaving such motor vehicle or motorcycle unattended by a person capable of operating it, for a period longer than necessary to load or unload passengers or freight.

"Stand," as used herein, shall mean the stopping of a motor vehicle or motorcycle on the premises designated herein when such vehicle shall be occupied by a person or persons capable of operating it for a period longer than necessary to load or unload passengers or freight.

Section H. - Any violation of this law by a person, firm or corporation shall be deemed an offense, punishable by a fine not exceeding \$25.00, or imprisonment for a period not to exceed six (6) months, or both; provided, however, that for the purpose of conferring jurisdiction upon the courts and judicial offices; generally, such violation shall be deemed a misdemeanor and for such purposes only all provisions of law relating to misdemeanors shall apply to such violation.

Section I. - This Law is to be effective upon its adoption and proper filing as required by Law.

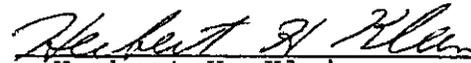

Zoning Ordinance which stated a Florist Business has to be in a B-1 Zoning. Karen Kline asked where this property is located and Town Clerk Klein explained it is on Route 277 kitty corner to Hickory Drive. Roy Seufert, owner of the property, stated he is trying to give his son a chance to start a business by converting his garage to a small flower shop, and rather than do it illegally he came before the Board to have it rezoned. Councilman Zimmerman was directed to check these changes and report to the Board.

Notices of Application Transmittal were received from the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation requesting a permit for Pearl Emerling, 9824 Trevett Road, to remove approximately 500 cubic yards of gravel from Eighteen Mile Creek at the Glenn Trevett property off Back Creek Road in the Town of Boston and Robert F. Borst, 8550 Zimmerman Road, to realign about 130 linear feet of Trib. 31a of Eighteen Mile Creek on applicant's property (8696 Maplelawn Drive) Town of Boston. Supervisor Stromecki directed the Town Clerk to post the Notices on the bulletin board.

A letter was received from Ken Killingbeck requesting information on the Water line on Taylor Road. Supervisor Stromecki directed the Town Clerk to send a letter to Mr. Killingbeck advising that the assessment on his property for Water District #1 is strictly on a vacant lot and that a study is underway to complete the waterline on all public streets in the Water District and we anticipate action by the Board within 90 days on this matter.

A letter was received from New York State Department of Audit and Control acknowledging receipt of Local Law #2 of 1976 for the Town of Boston. The letter was received and filed.

A letter was read from Robert Barnes, Principal of the Elementary Schools in the Springville-Griffith Institute School District advising the Town Board that complaints are being received in regard to loud parties and drinking after ballgames at the Boston School. Supervisor Stromecki stated that copies of the letter had been sent to the Boston Police Department, Erie County Sheriff's Department and State Police along with a request to patrol this area. He noted he had not heard anything further.

A Notice of Proceedings before the Public Service Commission in regard to National Fuel Gas was read. Supervisor Stromecki directed the Town Clerk to post this notice on the bulletin board.

Linda Beyer, in referring to the permit for Pearl Emerling to remove gravel from the Glenn Trevett property, asked why she was getting it on his property. No one knew why and Town Attorney Maxwell explained that these are sent to the Town as a matter of information and the Town has no jurisdiction.

Linda Beyer stated that the 4th of July was perfect and asked that the people responsible be thanked.

Linda Beyer noted that the shoulders of Route 219 are terrible for bike riders and feared someone would have a serious accident. Supervisor Stromecki stated former Highway Superintendent Luno shared her concern. Town Clerk Klein stated that in a letter received from the New York State Department of Transportation they had stated the shoulders would be stabilized and felt a letter should be sent requesting information on what they are planning to do. Paul Ballachino stated there is at least a two foot dropoff into Holiday Drive and it has to be taken at an angle or the back bumper scrapes. Highway Superintendent Kreitzbender stated that guard rails on Hillcroft and 219 are needed. Councilman Smilinski stated he and Highway Superintendent Kreitzbender would make a survey and compile a list of complaints to forward to the New York State Department of Transportation. Mike Czechowski stated there is a sharp edge in front of his place and this would cause problems in the winter. Mr. John Walters of Feddick Road stated there was a dip in front of his home and people are taking it at high speeds thus causing them to fly through the air. Supervisor Stromecki stated he had been in touch with Legislator Ronald Bennett in regard to County roads in Boston and had been advised that Legislator Susan Lubick has adjourned each meeting of the Highway Committee so they are at a standstill, and Supervisor Stromecki felt the County roads will be a serious problem. The Highway Superintendent was directed to check branches on the north side of Shero Road as a Town resident complained they were obstructing the sight at the intersection of Patchin and Shero Road.

Mr. John Walter advised that approximately 200 people have been contacted in the Senior Citizen Survey and 69% feel low income housing is necessary for Boston, and 98% felt they would like to know more about the club activities.

AMENDMENT TO THE DOG ORDINANCE TOWN OF BOSTON

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Town Board of the Town of Boston, Erie County, New York, will hold a Public Hearing on July 7, 1976, at 8 P.M., Daylight Saving Time, in the Boston Town Hall, 8500 Boston State Road, Town of Boston, New York, at which time all interested parties will be heard relating to the following proposed amendments to the dog ordinance of the Town of Boston.

BE IT RESOLVED that Section 1 under said ordinance concerning definition of terms be expanded to include a new term to be known as "DOG WARDEN," which shall be set forth under Section 1 as Paragraph "d" to read as follows:

d.) "DOG WARDEN"—Person authorized by the Town Board to enforce the provisions of this local law; a dog warden shall have all the powers of a constable or the peace officer in the execution of the provisions of this local law, including the service of a summons, the service of an appearance ticket, pursuant to Section paragraphs 126 of the Agriculture and Markets Law of the State of New York.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Sections 6 through 14, inclusive, of said ordinance as they now appear in said ordinance shall be replaced, in full, with new Sections 6 through 17, which shall read, in full, as follows:

Section 6. Enforcement.

A. This local law shall be enforced by the Dog Warden or by the Town Police Department or any other enforcement officer.

b. The Dog Warden or a peace officer observing a violation of this local law in his presence shall issue and serve an appearance ticket for such violation. The appearance ticket shall be in the form prescribed by this Board by resolution in accordance with the provisions of Section paragraphs 126 of the Agriculture and Markets Law and this local law.

Section 7. Violations

Any dog which violates the provisions of this ordinance or which does not have a license, shall be impounded and taken to such place as may be designated by the Town Board as a place of detention, and shall there be properly fed and cared for at the expense of the town until disposition thereof shall have been made in accordance with the provisions of this local law.

Section 8. Seizure of licensed dogs.

In the event that the dog seized bears a license tag, the person seizing the dog shall, within three (3) days thereafter, ascertain the name of the owner and give the owner immediate notice by serving upon the owner an instrument, in writing, stating that the dog has been seized, indicating when, where and why the dog was seized, and stating that the dog will be destroyed unless redeemed or a trial is demanded within twelve

LEGAL NOTICE

(12) days of the impounding of the dog.

Section 9. Seizure of unlicensed dogs.

In the event that the dog seized does not bear a license tag and the owner is unknown, the Warden or other law enforcement officer shall be authorized to destroy the dog seven (7) days after impounding or to dispose of the dog by sale or other means unless the owner redeems the dog, if permitted, or unless a trial is demanded by the owner within seven (7) days of seizure.

Section 10. Return of dog.

If the dog is to be redeemed, the owner shall pay the Dog Warden a fee of ten dollars (\$10.00) plus the charge for the dog while impounded.

Section 11. (Trial Procedure)

a. The owner of a dog who is issued an appearance ticket pursuant to this ordinance may answer the same by registered or certified mail, return receipt requested, within five (5) days of the violation (5) as hereunder provided in lieu of a personal appearance on the return date at the time and court specified in said appearance ticket.

b. If the person charged with the violation admits to the violation as charged in the appearance ticket, he may complete the appropriate form on such appearance ticket and forward such form and appearance ticket to the office specified on such appearance ticket. Such appearance ticket shall set forth the schedule of penalties and fines for violations of this local law, and a certified check or money order in the amount of the penalty for the violation charged shall be submitted with such answer.

c. If the person charged with the violation denies part or all the violation as charged in the appearance ticket, he may complete the appearance ticket likewise prescribed for that purpose and forward such appearance ticket together with a certified check or money order in the amount of fifteen dollars (\$15.00) to the office of the court specified on such appearance ticket. Upon receipt of such answer shall be entered in the docket and a new return date established by said court officer. Such person shall be notified by return mail of the date and place of such return date and or trial and the security shall be returned upon appearance thereat. If a person shall fail to appear at a return date when such is provided for, pursuant to this section, the security posted to secure such appearance shall be forfeited and a summons or a warrant of arrest may be issued pursuant to the Criminal Procedure Law. The person charged with a violation hereunder, shall he request a trial as provided herein, shall pay for the care of the dog while impounded.

d. In the event that there is a violation of this ordinance based upon an information and not an appearance ticket, and the owner of the dog demands a trial, he shall post bail of Twenty-five (\$25.00)

LEGAL NOTICE

Dollars to pay for the care of the dog while impounded and demand, in writing, a trial. The warden or other law enforcement officer shall immediately proceed to file an information with a Town Justice so that the matter will appear on the docket of the Town Justice Court as soon as possible. The rules of procedure and proof applicable in criminal actions shall apply.

Section 12. Forfeiture of title to dog.

If an impounded dog is not redeemed within the time hereinbefore set forth, the owner shall forfeit title to the dog, and it may thereafter be sold by the town or destroyed by the appropriate official as hereinafter provided.

Section 13. Sale of impounded dog.

The Warden is hereby authorized to sell any dog impounded at such price as he shall determine to be fair and shall deposit such sum in the general fund of the town. The town shall keep a record of all sales and such records shall be open to public inspection. Such records shall be kept for one (1) year.

Section 14. Dogs destroyed.

In the event that it becomes necessary to destroy a dog, the Warden or other law enforcement officer shall arrange, through a veterinarian or Dog Warden in his facilities, to humanely destroy and dispose of the carcass. Any Dog Warden that destroys a dog must make a report in writing to the Chief Dog Warden. This report and the Chief Warden's report will be submitted to his superior and will be kept on the file for one (1) year.

Section 15. Penalties for offenses.

A violation of this local law shall be deemed an offense, and a person convicted of a violation shall be liable to a fine for a first violation of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00); for a second violation, a fine of fifty dollars (\$50.); and for a third and subsequent violation, a fine of seventy-five dollars (\$75.). In addition, a dog found to be dangerous may be ordered securely confined or destroyed in the discretion of the court.

Section 16. Severability.

If any section of this local law shall be adjudged invalid, the remainder of this local law shall be deemed valid and effective.

Section 17. No compensation for dogs destroyed.

The owner, possessor or harbinger of any dog destroyed under the provisions of this local law shall not be entitled to any compensation and no action shall be maintainable thereafter to recover the value of the dog.

At this Hearing, at the above time and place noted, all interested persons will be heard for or against the proposed amendment.

At 8:00 P. M. a Public Hearing was held to consider an Amendment to the Town of Boston Dog Ordinance. The legal notice was read by the Town Clerk. Town Attorney Maxwell stated this ordinance was an amendment to the original ordinance adopted in 1964, and explained that the amendment adds to the definition of a Dog Warden and allows the Dog Warden to issue appearance tickets where the original ordinance made it necessary for a complaintant to file an information with the Court. Town Attorney Maxwell recommended that the following corrections be made in the proposed amendment to the

Dog Ordinance:

- (1) wherever the words "local law" appear change to Ordinance.
- (2) Section 8 - Sentence 2 - add authorized in front of the word person.
- (3) Section 10 - Sentence 1 - add and is licensed after word redeemed.
Sentence 2 - cross out from plus to impounded and add and if the dog is unlicensed the owner prior to redemption shall procure a license.
- (4) Section 11 - Paragraph C - cross out last sentence.
- (5) Paragraph D - Sentence 4 - cross out from to pay to impounded.
- (6) Section 13 - Sentence 5 - cross out one (1) and add six (6).
- (7) Section 14 - Sentence 7 - cross out one (1) and add ten (10).

Town Attorney Maxwell stated that a person cannot be charged for board while the dog is impounded thus these sections have to be eliminated, noting this information had been received from General Codes. The amount of time records must be kept was pointed out by Town Clerk Klein.

Paul Pietrizak asked if the Dog Warden was in the neighborhood and saw a dog running loose would the owner receive a ticket. Supervisor Stromecki stated that if the dog was not on its own property or on other property / permission it would be a violation of the ordinance. without

Mr. John Walters stated he felt an ordinance is being considered that cannot be lived by and pointed out this is a country community and there are hunters out with dogs. Supervisor Stromecki stated this ordinance is to solve the problem of dogs in garbage and those allowed to run at large.

There was discussion in regard to the amount of fine prescribed and Town Attorney Maxwell stated the words "up to" could be added before the amount of fine. Following discussion it was decided to leave the amount of fines as they are set forth.

Dean Watkins stated that dogs are let out and allowed to run and ruin his shrubbery and something has to be done. Edie Schramm stated at times there are 15 or 16 dogs in her yard and she is unable to even leave her house. Supervisor Stroemcki stated that he has many calls during the day and he realized that something must be done and felt that the courts would be crowded at first and also many warnings would be issued by the Enforcement Agencies and Dog Warden. He stated that an effort has to be made to make it easier for the Law Enforcement People to carry out their part of the law and at present it is an inconvenience for our Dog Warden who only receives \$1400 a year for patrolling and picking up dead dogs and burying them on his property.

Jean Kleis asked who would be responsible if a dog owned by a child was cited. Town Attorney Maxwell stated it would be the responsibility of the parent as the ordinance reads owner or harbinger. Joan Pfanner stated she was all for the ordinance as Hillcroft Drive is known as the "comfort station of Boston", and garbage has to be picked up two and three times a day.

A resident asked how the ordinance would be implemented and Supervisor Stromecki stated that the Dog Warden would be empowered to issue an appearance ticket. He also explained that a private citizen can still file an information with the Court. In answer to a question it was noted that all dogs must wear a tag. Supervisor Stromecki stated that the Dog Warden will be passing out copies of the ordinance if it is passed.

Carolyn Shadle stated she was in favor of the amendment and what has bothered her is reporting a neighbor so if she told the Dog Warden of a violation would she have to report her name. Supervisor Stromecki stated it is a good idea to give your name so the Dog Warden could report to her that he has contacted the violator.

A motion was made by Councilman Wittmeyer and seconded by Councilman Kennedy to close the Public Hearing.

Supervisor Stromecki reported that there have been many meetings of the Police Study Committee and the minutes of the meetings with the State Police, Sheriff's Department and Town Police are on record at the Town Clerk's Office and are for public inspection of anyone interested. The recommendations of Councilman Kennedy and Councilman Wittmeyer were read. The recommendation of the Committee was read and it stated that the New York State Police are to be the prime Enforcement Agency in the Town of Boston and dispatch the Boston Constabulary when they are in Service. A motion was made by Councilman Wittmeyer and seconded by Councilman Kennedy that the recommendation of the Police Study Committee be accepted in full.

A letter was read from Congressman Henry Nowak in regard to the money earmarked for Route 219 by the United States Department of Transportation. Supervisor Stromecki stated that Mr. Nowak has the interest of his people in mind and it appears there will be more money for Route 219 coming in the future. The letter was received and filed.

A memorandum was received from the Erie County Health Department relative to disinfection of new lines, equipment, repairs, etc. Supervisor Stromecki stated that this would not affect our new Water District. The memo was received and filed.

A letter was received from the New York State Electric and Gas Corporation advising the Town Board of the following Street Light change as authorized in a Town Board resolution of May 10, 1976:

Councilman Kennedy stated he had been questioned by constituents to the placing of a street light at the intersection of Glenn Terrace and Kevin Drive. Town Clerk Klein stated that when street lights were placed at intersections, some of the intersections in subdivisions were omitted. Supervisor Stromecki stated this matter should be brought to the attention of Councilman Zimmerman and discussed at budget time.

A Notice of Application Transmittal was received from the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation for a permit request of Robert Friant, 8013 Back Creek Road to slope the Eighteen Mile Creek bank with gravel from in stream bars and place stone rip-rap along a maximum of 1,000 feet of creek bank on his property. Supervisor Stromecki directed the Town Clerk to post the Notice on the bulletin Board. The request was received and filed.

A letter was read from William J. Donohue, Director, Erie County Community Development Program in regard to the Village of Williamsville rejecting the rezoning of a parcel of property to permit an elderly housing unit to be built. The letter further stated that HUD had put a hold on 1975 Community Development funding for Williamsville and rejected their 1976 project, and noted the reason this was done and how other communities can avoid this happening to them. Supervisor Stromecki stated that there is an obligation of all municipalities receiving Community Development funding to take care of everyone, the rich,

the poor, the housed and unhoused. He stated he has talked with Mr. Donohue and expressed his opinion on the housing for the elderly in Boston as they are often forgotten. He stated he felt we were quite a few years away from this, but he has let his feelings be known.

A letter was read from Michael A. Amico, Erie County Sheriff requesting the Boston Town Board to pass a resolution supporting a request to the Erie County Legislature and Erie County Executive that the 1977 budget be returned to at least the present operating level. A letter was also read from Daniel Clark, Chairman of the 4-H Executive Committee requesting the Boston Town Board to urge the Erie County Legislature and County Executive to place in the budget the necessary funds for the Cooperative Extension. Supervisor Stromecki stated he and the Board did not feel it was right to put political pressure on the Legislature and County Executive and it is their duty to do what is justly right. The letters were received and filed.

Mr. Charles Boldt, 7626 Chestnut Ridge Road stated that he and Mr. John Koeppl a neighbor were interested in receiving water service in Water District #1 and wished to run pipe from their property to the Water line along Route 219. Town Attorney Maxwell stated the first step they should take is to find out if the elevation is such that they will be able to get the proper water pressure. He further stated that they would have to pay for all of the pipe, engineering fees and all other costs incurred. Town Attorney Maxwell stated that a Public Hearing would be necessary before a tap in could be made.

Supervisor Stromecki introduced James Kaszubowski who is the Town of Boston Sewer Maintenance Man PT, noting he has replaced Clive Rucker who resigned.

A group of members of the Boston Emergency Squad were at the meeting and George Aiple acting as spokesman stated that the State Police are not arriving at accident scenes until they have patients loaded and cited three instances where this has happened in the last few days thus causing a hazard as there is no one to direct traffic. He further noted that the Town Police were always present in the past and the Emergency Squad would like the Town to reassess their stand on the Boston Constabulary. There was a lengthy discussion and Supervisor Stromecki, Councilman Kennedy and Councilman Wittmeyer, members of the Police Study Committee explained that the Constabulary is still in existence and the recommendation of the committee in no way changed the status of the Constabulary only that they are being dispatched by the State Police and if they do not have a car on the road the State Police will answer the call. They further noted that if the Town Police are not on patrol it is the Constables decision not to patrol. Supervisor Stromecki pointed out that Harry Strack has been on patrol eleven out of twelve days and Joseph Antos has been out. Councilman Kennedy asked that the instances and dates be written down so when there is a evaluation by the Police Study Committee these can be taken into account.

Kay Yoerk, Herman Hill Road asked that the Town do something to prevent people from dumping in the ravine off Herman Hill Road. The State Highway Department has also been seen dumping in the ravine at the top of Herman Hill Road. She noted that when there is a hard rain trash comes down the creek, plugs the ditch and causes extensive flooding. Supervisor Stromecki stated that Highway Superintendent Kreitzbender has ordered new sluice pipe which should alleviate some of the problem. The Town Clerk was directed to send letters to the residents bordering the creek and the State Highway Department asking their assistance in keeping the creek clean of debris.

A letter was presented to the Town Board from Charles Boldt and John Koepple to Mr. Robert Martens requesting the inclusion of their property in County Sewer District #3.

Joan Pfanner noted that she was an election inspector for the County Sewer Referendum and Town Clerk Klein was a great assistance to them.

Highway Superintendent Kreitzbender noted that there is a street light out on the corner of Rice Road and Back Creek Road. Mildred Dolce stated that the street sign at this intersection has been removed.

A Soil Removal Permit application was received from George Hornberger. Councilman Wittmeyer stated Councilman Zimmerman, Councilman Smolinski and he had gone to Mr. Hornbergers to check this out and as a portion of it was under water, they were unable to get to it. This matter was tabled to the September 1, 1976 meeting.

A motion was made by Supervisor Stromecki and seconded by Councilman Kennedy appointing Frances C. Vacanti, 7738 Boston Colden Road as a Democratic Election Inspector in District #3 as recommended by Town Chairman High Brown to replace Eike Renzoni who resigned.

Supervisor Stromecki thanked Mrs. Georger for the painting and stated it gave him great pleasure to accept it on behalf of the Town Board.

Supervisor Stromecki stated there have been communications from the Police Department on directives, pistol permits, the use of firearms and things of that nature. He stated that it is his directive that all members of the Constabulary obtain a pistol permit. Supervisor Stromecki stated that additional insurance was requested and on some insurance there is more on them presently than they have requested. He noted that they are looking into increasing medical insurance from \$1,000 to \$5,000 and also looking into increasing Life Insurance as we as a Town are responsible for the Constables. Supervisor Stromecki stated that there will be a meeting of the Police Department and Town Board on Sunday, August 8th at 10:00 A. M. to iron out the problems in the Police Department.

Supervisor Stromecki stated the Regional Planning Board has sent a Town Map and he asked that Councilman Kennedy and Councilman Wittmeyer look this over and report as soon as possible. Councilman Kennedy stated that he would like to go over this with the Boston Planning Board and although there was a deadline by the County he did not want to rush into it.

Doll, Do-It-All, Inc. for a variance to build a home on a lot not having frontage on a dedicated highway.

Councilman Smolinski reported that he and Highway Superintendent Kreitzbender had made a survey of Route 219 and the following were their recommendations:

1. Continuation of the paving from corner of Boston Colden Road to Boston Concord Town Line.
2. Construction of shoulders to eliminate sharp drop off as a result of new paving from Boston Colden Road to Patchin. This construction to be comparable to the shoulder construction which was done south of Boston-Concord Town Line.
3. Paving of intersection approaches of all roads connecting Route 219 to eliminate sharp drop off.
4. Excavate dirt bank to widen shoulders and increase visibility at intersection of Route 219 and Trevett Road.
5. Improve shoulder on southeast side of intersection of Route 219 and Sunset

Drive which has about one foot drop off all the way to Boston Library driveway.

6. Improve shoulder at Cooper Hood Restaurant and Pfluger's Restaurant which has a bad drop off and repair broken pavement edges at Ski's Pizzeria.
7. Correct flooding at Chestnut Ridge Road and Route 219.
8. Install water interceptor at driveway leading to Schunk's Apartments, 7699 Boston State Road.
9. Install guard rails on both sides of Route 219, south of Hillcroft Drive.

The Town Clerk was directed to send this information to the New York State Department of Transportation and to thank Mr. Ketchum for his efforts in the improvements already made to Route 219.

Councilman Smolinski reported that the Boston Youth Baseball picnic will be held on Saturday, August 7 at Chestnut Ridge and invited all Board members and Town Officials to attend.

Supervisor Stromecki stated he felt a meeting should be set up with former Supervisor Sedovy, Councilman Smolinski, Highway Superintendent Kreitzbender and himself to work on a new baseball diamond for the park noting that there is a Master Plan which was drawn up previously. He also requests Councilman Smolinski to have a report on costs and such for the September meeting.

Councilman Kennedy stated that the Planning Board has requested the Town to consider the appropriation of funds in this years budget to initiate study for a townwide drainage plan. Councilman Kennedy stated in light of the heavy rains there was a lot of flooding experienced in Town and with the advent of sewers and Water District on the west hill the Planning Board is concerned about the destruction of the watershed and the proposed Expressway will also destroy some of the watershed. The Town Clerk was directed to make sure the Planning Board was on the budgetary requests.

A letter was read from Town Engineer Moncreiff to the United States Environmental Protection Agency in regard to the NPDES Permits. The letter was received and filed.

A letter was read from the New York State Police in regard to the installation of New York State Police radios in the Boston Police Car, and also the dispatching of the Boston Police.

A letter was read from the Boston Police Department to the Town Board thanking the temporary constables for their assistance at the July 4th Bicentennial Parade. The Town Clerk was directed to find out if letters had been sent to the Temporary constables by the Police Department and if not to send them a letter.

A motion was made by Supervisor Stromecki and seconded by Councilman Wittmeyer denying the request of the Boston Police Department for John Hinkey, Mary Thomas and Dale Knobloch to attend a Sex Crime Investigation Course at Erie Community College - South from September 21 to October 12, 1976, as the New York State Police have been designated as the prime law enforcement agency and the New York State Police is professionally equipped to handle the situation and to put such circumstances upon the Constabulary is beyond the call of duty.

The Building Inspectors Monthly Report was received.

A motion was made by Supervisor Stromecki and seconded by Councilman Kennedy appointing Richard Lee to the Boston Recreation Staff at a salary of \$300.00 to replace Guy Steinmetz who was appointed at the July meeting at a salary of \$315.00 and is not working.

A letter was read from Charles Marcus of the Assessment Board of Review advising the Town Board of his election as Chairperson for 1977. He also noted that at the July 6th session only three of the five members were present and asked the Town Board to encourage the improvement of this situation. Supervisor Stromecki stated that he has talked to one of the members about his absence and would presently contact the other one and should have a report for the Town Board soon. The Town Clerk was directed to send a letter to Mr. Marcus telling him that we are happy he has been elected chairperson and to offer the assistance of the Town Board to ease their burden.

A motion was made by Supervisor Stromecki and seconded by Councilman Kennedy granting permission to four members of the Boston Planning Board to attend a Planning Board seminar at Kutschers in the Catskills from October 10 to October 12, 1976.

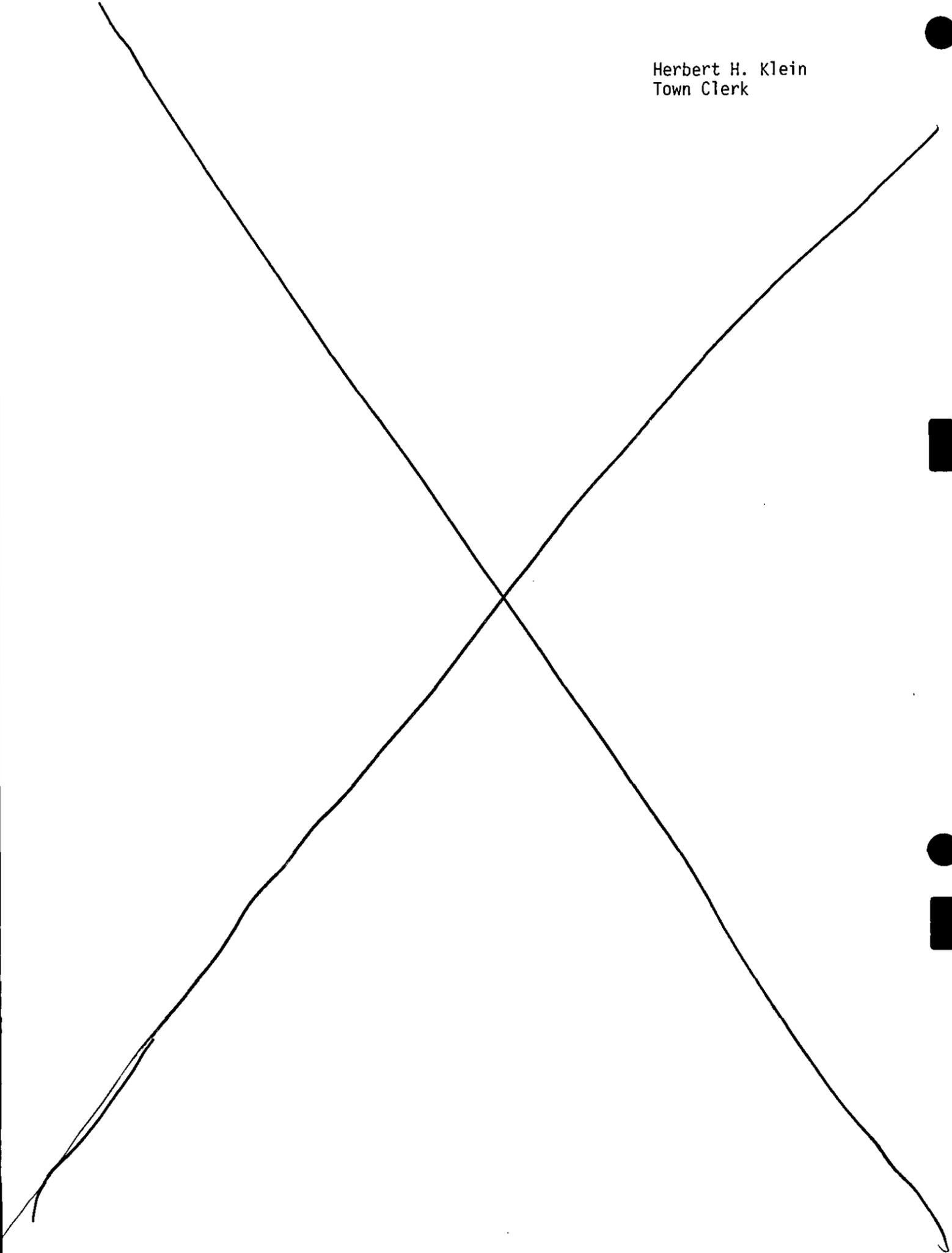

A letter was also read from Charles J. Fiorella, Attorney for Mr. and Mrs. Doyka, 7767 Zimmerman Road stating that damage had been done to the Doyka property due to the construction of a water line. Town Clerk Klein stated that Utica Mutual, Insurance Carrier for the Town of Boston called today and asked that they be sent a copy of the Water District #2 contract to see if the Town has any responsibility. 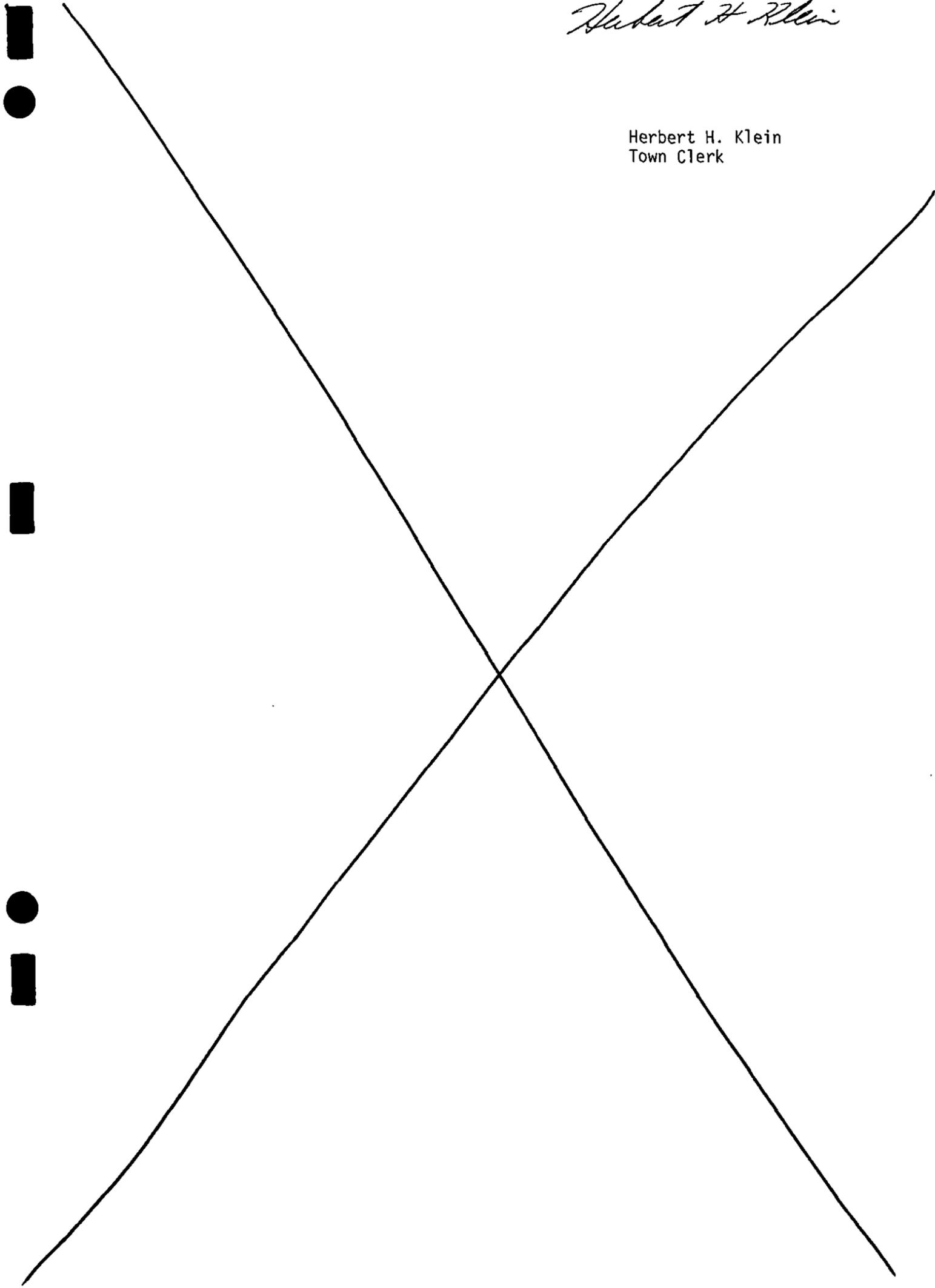

WHEREAS, the Town of Boston wishes to remedy the acute shortage of decent, safe, and sanitary dwellings for families of low income; and

WHEREAS, the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, Title II, § 201 (a) (8) (Public Law 93-383, 88 Stat. 662) provides rental assistance payments for the purpose of aiding lower income families in obtaining a decent place to live and of promoting economically mixed housing; and

WHEREAS, the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, Title II, § 201 (a) (8) (b) authorizes the Secretary of the Department of Housing and Urban Development to enter into annual contributions contracts with public housing agencies (PHA) pursuant to which such agencies may enter into contracts to make assistance payments to owners of existing dwelling units (Section 8 Housing Assistance Payments Program - existing housing); and

WHEREAS, the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 Title II, § 201 (a) (3) (part 6) defines public housing agency as any State, County, municipality or other governmental entity or public body (or agency or instrumentality thereof) which is authorized to engage in or assist in the development or operation of low-income housing; and

WHEREAS, the Town of Boston possesses the necessary authority under the laws of the State of New York to engage in or assist in the development or operation of lower-income housing; and

WHEREAS, the Department of Housing and Urban Development has stated at 24 CFR Part 882.103 (c) that preference in funding under the Section 8 Housing

Assistance Payments Program will be given to PHA's which provide lower-income families the broadest geographical choice of housing units; and

WHEREAS, such broad geographical choice of units can only be achieved by developing administrative arrangements between PHA's to permit holders of certificates of Section 8 eligibility to seek existing housing units in the broadest possible area; and

WHEREAS, the Town of Boston possesses the requisite authority under the laws of the State of New York to enter into such cooperative agreements with other municipalities in Erie County which similarly qualify as public housing agencies under Federal and State law;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT

RESOLVED, that the Town of Boston affirms that it qualifies as a public housing agency as defined in Title II of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 and may administer a Section 8 Housing Assistance Payments Program for existing housing pursuant to Title II of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Town of Boston shall enter into cooperation with other member PHA's in Erie County for the purpose of applying for and administering a single Section 8 Housing Assistance Payments Program; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the PHA of the Town of Boston declare its intention to authorize a member PHA to act as applicant PHA for the purpose of applying to the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development and contracting with the same for participation in the Section 8 Housing Assistance Payments Program for existing housing pursuant to Title II of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the PHA of the Town of Boston declare its intention to authorize the applicant PHA to contract with an acceptable agency or firm for the administration of a Section 8 Housing Assistance Payments Program for existing housing pursuant to Title II of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974.

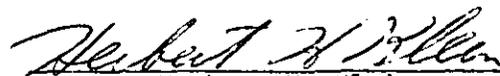

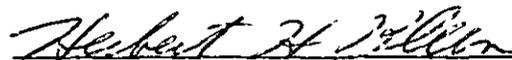

A Notice of Cancellation of Designation of Restricted Highway was received from the New York State Department of Transportation and advised the Board as follows:

That portion of Route 219 (SH 527) beginning at a point 450 ft. South of its intersection with Omphalious Road thence Southerly to its intersection with Fairlane Drive a total distance of 1.0 mi. all in the Town of Boston, County of Erie.

A letter was read from Gary Burdick, Pastor of Faith United Church in regard to funding for the Springville Community Counseling Center. Also received were statistic sheets. Supervisor Stromecki stated he had met with Reverend Burdick to discuss the workings of the Center and if the Board wishes to meet with him, a meeting can be set up. Supervisor Stromecki stated that last year \$1,000.00 had been put in the budget for the Counseling Center and at this time it is not known how much funding there will be at the County level. A letter was read from the Town of Amherst requesting the Boston Town Board to pass a resolution supporting legislation to be introduced by Senator Anderson to amend a law paying court costs for cities to include Towns and Villages. Town Clerk Klein questioned if the State takes over costs won't this lead to District Courts. Supervisor Stromecki stated it is possible and Councilman Kennedy stated that he felt if it went in favor of District Courts it didn't make any difference if courts were State funded or not. A Notice of Application Transmittal was received from New York State Department of Environmental Conservation for a permit request of Duane Draudt, 6140 Wildwood Drive, Town of Boston to relocate approximately 200 ft. of Irish Gulf and plan rip-rap along its east bank at 6140 Wildwood Drive, Town of Boston, Erie County. The Town Clerk was directed to post the notice on the bulletin board.

The Annual Report of Operations, Expenditures and Annual Proposed Budget for 1977 of the Boston Emergency Squad was submitted to the Town Board. Supervisor Stromecki commended the Squad on the great service they are performing for the Town of Boston. The report was referred to the Town Board for their consideration when working on the 1977 Budget.

A letter was read from the Boston Emergency Squad advising the Town Board of a call they had received to Moore Road in the Town of Concord. They asked that the State Police, who made the call, be advised to try and dispatch the Chaffee Ambulance first. Supervisor Stromecki stated this has been an on going problem and Ken Barrie, Supervisor for the Town of Concord has been requested to take the matter before the Concord Town Board on different occasions. Town Clerk Klein stated he has sent letters to Mr. Barrie and then follow up letters, but never receives a reply. Supervisor Stromecki designated Councilman Wittmeyer and Councilman Zimmerman to study the costs and feasibility of extending Water District #1 lines. Planning. She stated the things they were specifically working on are stream sampling, coastal zone management, waste waters, sewage treatment and fiscal institutional arrangement to find out the pollution problems and how they can solve them. Ms. Carlin stated she realized that in Boston they were going into the Southtowns Sewage Facilities, so there really aren't too many problems here and that the State has classified Eighteen Mile Creek in this area as a Class "A" which means that with chlorination and other processes can be used as drinking water and is fishable and swimmable. She noted that what they were working toward by the end of next year is a plan for the whole region. She noted this plan will go to the Erie-Niagara Regional Planning Board for their approval, then on to the Governor for his approval, then to the E.P.A. in Washington for its approval. If the plan is approved by everyone then it will go into effect and some of the things every municipality should be concerned with Land Use and Population - A look to the future for the next 20 years and from this information a plan will be gleaned for the next 20 years. Ms. Carlin stated they would be around next year with a plan and each municipality will have to look at this plan especially the elected officials. He stated he had talked to Joe Ball who had wanted \$95.00 an hour for a truck and drivers and \$2.00 a yard to dump and would do the whole thing for \$3,800.00, but this couldn't be done as it would have to be let for bids for that amount. Town Clerk Klein stated he felt it would be best to rent a garbage truck as you can get four loads of the highway truck on one of the packers. A motion was made by Councilman Kennedy and seconded by Councilman Wittmeyer authorizing the Supervisor to hire Richard Penfold at \$30.00 per hour for truck and driver and \$30.00 per load for a maximum of four days.

The Town Justices Monthly reports were received.

A letter was read from John T. Collins, P.E., President of the Southern Tier Engineering advising the Town Board that he has left the engineering firm of Edwards & Moncreiff and has formed his own firm in Ellicottville, New York. The letter was received and filed.

A letter was received from the New York State Department of Transportation acknowledging receipt of a resolution adopted by the Boston Town Board relative to their support for the West Hill alignment of the proposed Southern Expressway. The letter was received and filed.

Two letters were received from the New York State Department of Transportation relative to letters of May 21, 1976 and August 9, 1976 from the Town Clerk transmitting the report of the Traffic Safety Committee in regard to improvements on Route 219. Supervisor Stromecki directed the Town Clerk to refer the letters from the Department of Transportation to the Traffic Safety Committee and they are to study them and make recommendations if there is work to be done by the Boston Highway Department. He also requested the Traffic Safety Committee to contact property owners and businesses for their cooperation in rectifying problems and for the Traffic Safety Committee to report at a future Town Board Meeting.

A letter was read from the New York State Department of Transportation relative to the dumping of materials by state trucks in the ravine at the top of Herman Hill Road. The letter was received and filed.

A letter was read from the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation advising the Town Board that their application for reimbursement of the direct costs for operation and maintenance of the sewage treatment works in Sewer District #2 had been approved for January 1, 1975 to December 31, 1975. The grant is in the amount of \$547.92 which is 10.5% of the maintenance costs. Supervisor Stromecki stated that the letter advises the Board that they are receiving 10.5% instead of the 33 1/3% previously received due to financial cutbacks by the State. The letter was received and filed.

A letter was read from Edward Przybylski, Department Environmental Quality in answer to a letter from Supervisor Stromecki relative to the Preliminary Phase #1 Plans for Sewer District #3. The letter was received and filed. Supervisor Stromecki stated a meeting had been held on October 18, 1976 with Robert Martens of the Department of Environmental Quality and certain items were resolved.

At 8:15 P. M. a Public Hearing was held to consider the request of Herbert D. Warren to rezone his property at 9220 Boston State Road from Residential Restricted Business RRB to Business B-1. The legal notice was read by the Town Clerk. A letter was read from Mr. Warren advising the Town Board of his reasons for requesting this zoning change. A letter was read from the Boston Planning Board advising the Town Board that by a vote of three to two with one abstention, they recommend that the request be denied and their reasons. A petition signed by three Town of Boston residents against the rezoning of Mr. Warren's property was read and also a petition signed by forty-one Boston residents in favor of rezoning was read. A communication was received from the Erie County Planning Board recommending that the request for rezoning be denied and giving the reasons. Mrs. Linda Beyer, 9251 Boston State Road stated she is opposed to having the zoning changed to business and agrees with the Planning Board that as long as Mr. Warren has it there will probably be no problem, but what is going to happen when the man next door can't sell his property as he is next to a collision shop. She stated she could not see any reason to change a residential zone into a business zone. Mrs. Beyer went on to say that it was hard to come and speak against your neighbor and she did not mean it personally, but she did not want a business across the street from her.

Mr. Albert Feltz, 9230 Boston State Road stated he did not have any objections and this business would be next door to him. James Schunk, who owns rental property in the area of Mr. Warren's home, stated he had enough trouble with his tenants complaining about telephone trucks parked on the lawn without them complaining about a collision shop. He stated it would be noisy and there would be wrecked cars around all of the time. Mrs. Kay Currie of 9257 Boston State Road, stated she agreed with everything that had been brought up, pointing out there would be noise and possible pollution and she agreed with both Planning Boards. Mrs. Currie further stated that another reason was there were all homes in that area and it has some of the oldest houses in Boston and she felt a lot of money had been put into restoring these homes and if a business went in it would bring down the value of these homes.

Mr. Kenneth Schunk asked if the names on the petitions were land owners or tenants. Town Clerk Klein read the names on the petitions. Mr. Schunk stated that one of the names on the list for the rezoning was his tenant. He stated he felt he should have been contacted instead of the tenants as they are here today and gone tomorrow. Supervisor Stromecki stated the Town Board did not circulate the petition. Town Clerk Klein stated the petition against had been presented by Linda Beyer, but he did not know who had circulated it and the one for was sworn to by Robert Warren.

Mr. Herbert Warren stated that he had been granted the 33rd Building Permit in Boston to expand his business. He stated he did not know the date, but it was when the issuing of permits was first started. Mr. Warren stated everyone is doing business and he is causing a lot of commotion just trying to do what the Town wants a person to do. He pointed out that there was no way in the to the water tower and Supervisor Stromecki stated that was not the question before the Board. Mr. Warren stated that people talk about beautiful Boston and his property is 100% lawn and it is not rubbish or brush and that is the way he keeps his yard. He further stated that the tanks he uses for his plumbing are kept inside and he does not know what more he can do to keep a place up.

Supervisor Stromecki stated he did not feel that anyone was questioning his business practice in the past. Mr. Warren asked why were people against him and he had not petitioned them they had petitioned him. He asked if the people did not like business in that area, why did most of the people come there and need something and want something. Mr. Warren stated he was retiring in about twenty days and he would be home full time so his business would expand. He stated he had a permit for his plumbing and the place had been kept up so he could not see why his request would be denied. Mr. Warren further stated that his son was in college and it costs money so how was he going to pay for it if he couldn't work. He further stated that his wife was born in their place and way back it was zoned business. Mr. Warren stated that if his son can't work on the property what good was it. He stated he hated to throw stones at anyone, but if they were going to throw them at him he could throw them back and pointed out when he looked out his back door he didn't see lawn. He further stated that the lady that petitioned him had an unprotected pond and he felt it should be fenced in as there are children two and three years old around it. Mr. Mike Czechowski pointed out that a few years back he had requested a rezoning and had been denied, but they say you can't spot zone so you can't and he went along with it. Mr. Czechowski stated that as the Planning Board had recommended a denial, you have to go with their decision. Town Attorney Maxwell stated that the Planning Board is advisory and the ultimate decision is up to the Town Board. Mr. Maxwell asked if there had been a recommendation from the Erie

County Planning Board. Supervisor Stromecki stated yes they recommended denial, and Town Attorney Maxwell stated that then a majority vote plus one would be necessary to pass the rezoning.

Mrs. Linda Beyer stated that if it is given to one then everyone will be coming in stating if you gave it to him give it to me. She stated she knew of another place that wanted a Business Zoning, but had been told no as it was zoned Residential Restrict Business RRB. Mrs. Beyer stated they had not complained before about Mr. Warren and if they had a car to be fixed they would get a price from him, but it is the business zoning they are objecting to as it is just the start of a whole string along that area. Mr. John Koza stated Mr. Warren is a good neighbor and his argument is that the Town Board agreed to give the Rucker Lumber Company the right to expand to the creek with no objection and that is a bigger obstacle to the scenery in the Town of Boston than anything else and he was sure Mr. Warren would not have something like that. He further stated he did not see how the Town Board or Planning Board cannot give him a permit on this basis. He stated what is said here creates animosity between neighbors as the Town Board probably has their mind made up to what they are going to do. Supervisor Stromecki asked Mr. Koza to stick to the facts and not make conclusionary statements as the Town Board now is a different one than in the past. Mr. Koza asked the Town Board to come to his place and look at the Rucker Lumber Company. Supervisor Stromecki stated he had looked at it. Councilman Kennedy stated Rucker Lumber was a different issue altogether as that was a B-1 zoning.

Dr. Peter Berst, 9290 Boston State Road, stated that if the zoning was changed it could not be reverted later and if it should be sold it could be expanded and made as unattractive as they want. Supervisor Stromecki stated Rucker should not come into this, but for clarification there was previous business there already and it was an expansion of an existing business and this was a change of residential to business. Mr. Warren stated all he wanted to do was keep it off the main road and keep it in back as he didn't want the trucks and cars in his front lawn, but down in the back. He further stated he did not want to run his property down.

Councilman Kennedy stated he sympathized with Mr. Warren in his request and a discussion came up in the Planning Board similar to what Mr. Warren said and the same concerns were voiced similar to those of Dr. Berst and Mrs. Beyer. Mr. Kennedy stated that the concern is with the change in rezoning from Residential Restricted Business RRB to Business B-1 that even though Mr. Warren may maintain that property with no problems in the area, the concern is what might happen if the property changes hands. He stated it has been the policy of the previous Board to deny requests for spot zoning which this would be. Mr. Kennedy stated the Planning Board sympathized with Mr. Warren's position, but when it came time for the vote it was their decision to recommend denial of the changes of the zoning and this was the position he would have to take as they had to be concerned with the other people in the area. Mr. Warren stated it was not spot zoning as there is the Rucker Lumber Company and New York Telephone Company and a water tower. Councilman Kennedy stated Rucker Lumber Company is zoned business, but to his knowledge the New York Telephone Company is RRB as that was never changed. He explained that when RRB zoning went in it wiped out some business zoning and after a review of the ordinance some amendments were added to rezone to Business, Rucker, Barretts and others as it was unfair to them as they were established businesses. Mr. Warren stated that if his request is denied and there is any business whatsoever from his house to uptown that would be discriminating against him. Councilman Kennedy stated it certainly would, but there are some businesses allowed in a RRB zoning such as Doctors, Lawyers and those that would not create a nuisance. He also pointed out that the business Mr. Warren has applied for in some communities would only be allowed in an Industrial Zone. Mr. Warren stated he had been here before the Zoning Ordinance was drawn up and asked if he now had to shut down at that location. Councilman Kennedy stated no, but he was asking for a rezoning to B-1 and there is concern in that area, as there have been calls to the Town Board members, from people who would not identify themselves. Councilman Kennedy stated there will be a lot of people who come out here that would like to acquire business property and if it is zoned business, they might make a lucrative offer to someone and they might not maintain the property in the same manner that Mr. Warren has. He stated that it has been an experience that when a collision shop comes in it does deteriorate a neighborhood and he was not saying that in Mr. Warren's case this would happen, but the effects of the B-1 change would have to be considered. Mr. Warren asked if he bought a business in Town could he put it in there. Town Attorney Maxwell stated if the area was business it could be used for business purposes.

Councilman Smolinski asked Mr. Warren about the furniture repair shop. Mr. Warren stated they were planning to add to the plumbing business, counter tops. Councilman Smolinski asked if in the same building was there going to be a collision shop. Mr. Warren stated he had four buildings. Councilman Kennedy stated that there just seemed to be objections to the rezoning.

Councilman Wittmeyer noted he had been down to Ruckers and he had looked over Mr. Warren's property and asked if all the properties ran to the creek. Mr. Warren stated no, John Koza runs behind him and a neighbor, but his other property runs to the creek. Mr. Warren asked how the new lawn mower sales in North Boston got a permit. Town Clerk Klein stated that all of the property from B-Kwik to the four corners was zoned business. It was noted that this was done in about 1963, so therefore he only had to get a sign permit. Mr. Warren asked why his area was left out and Supervisor Stromecki stated past Town Boards would have to be asked that question.

Supervisor Stromecki read what businesses can be conducted in a RRB zoning. Mr. Warren questioned if he could store items on his property. Supervisor Stromecki stated that he was not giving a legal opinion, but it is possible that if his business preceded the zoning ordinance, and this Mr. Warren would have to determine himself, he could continue with his business and no one was implying at this point that his plumbing business was in violation, but the question is the rezoning of his property which is a different situation altogether. He stated no one is saying that if the rezoning request is denied that Warren plumbing has to go out of business. Mr. Warren stated he now understood and asked if when he was finished could his son continue under the "Grandfather Clause". Town Attorney Maxwell stated under a non-conforming use prior to the Zoning Ordinance it could continue as a plumbing business, but it cannot be expanded. He further stated it was up to Mr. Warren to prove a business existed prior to the ordinance.

Supervisor Stromecki stated he had had many phone calls relative to this matter stating that it is hard to come before and speak against their neighbors. Supervisor Stromecki stated a Public Hearing is not to pit neighbor against neighbor, but a matter of law which must be done. He told Mr. Warren it is his privilege to come before the Board and petition for something. He further stated that the neighbors who called have been in opposition to the rezoning and have stated there has been disruption of their televisions, the running of machinery has been disruptive to them, there has been evidence of heavy vehicular traffic, evidence of squealing of wheels and the driving of fast cars. Supervisor Stromecki stated the people had stated they did not want to appear publicly against their neighbor, but did feel they should advise someone. He stated that under the circumstances of the complaints, his own personal opinion and the recommendations of the Planning Boards he would have to concur with Mr. Kennedy's feeling that his request for a business zoning would have to be denied and he would vote against it. He pointed out that this decision would in no way interfere with his present plumbing business. Mr. Warren stated that he did not like the crack about squealing tires and wished the person who had said it would stand up.

Mrs. Kay Currie stated she was not against Mr. Warren's plumbing business, but she did object to rezoning the lot business as when it is sold they can put in anything they want.

A motion was made by Councilman Kennedy and seconded by Councilman Zimmerman to close the Public Hearing.

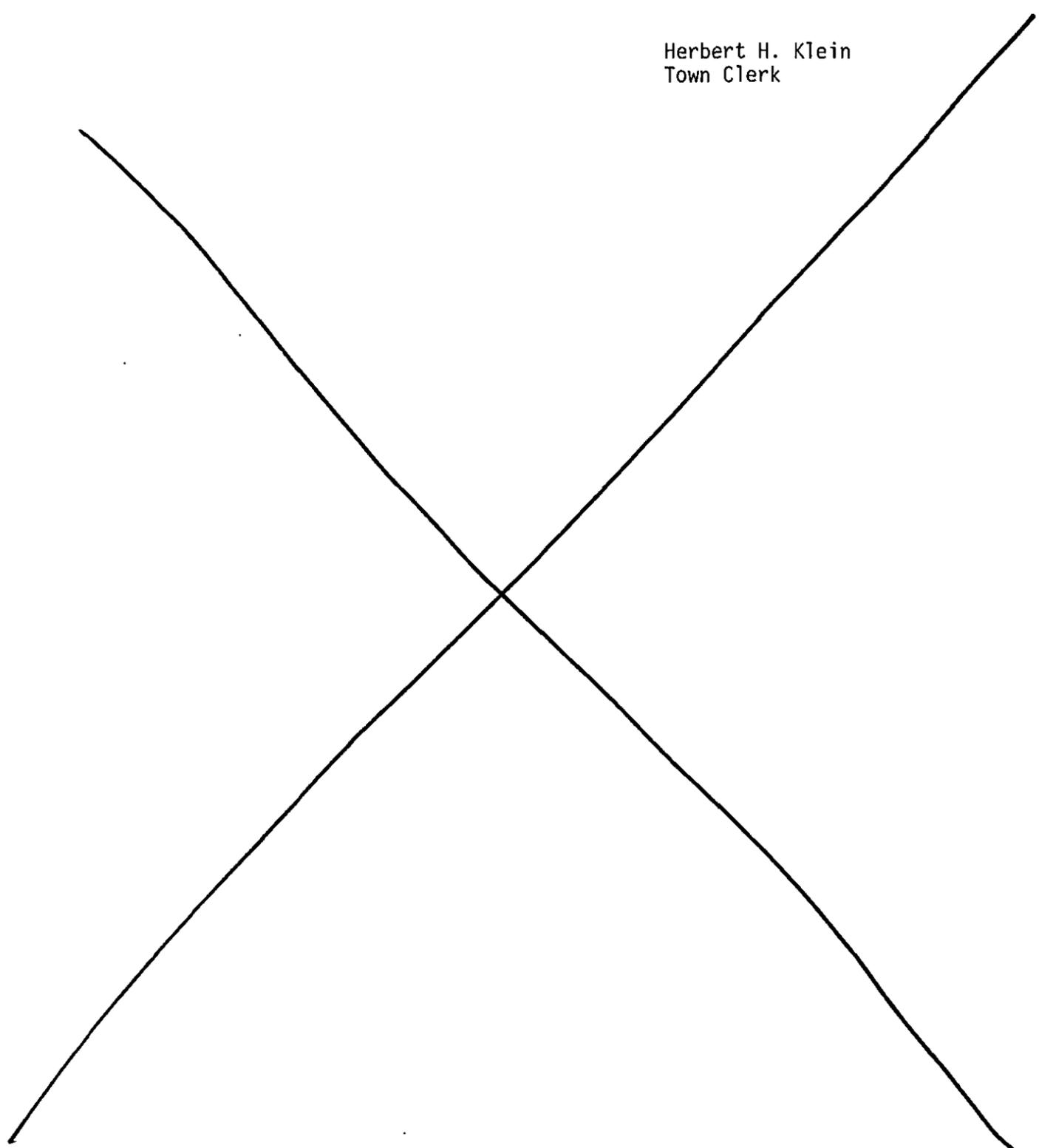

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Town Board of the Town of Boston memorialize United States Senators Jacob Javits and James Buckley of the Town of Boston's strong opposition and displeasure with the net effect that enactment of HR 10210 would have in mandating that State and Local governments will pay unemployment insurance or, in alternative, 100% of the cost of benefits for laid-off employees. Such legislation, if enacted, would significantly raise administrative costs to the Town of Boston, especially since this Town has a history of maintaining strict budgetary rules in hiring, for the most part, only to replace those employees lost by attrition, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Town Clerk forward a certified copy of this resolution to United States Senators Javits and Buckley.

A notice of Complaint was received from John Smolinski advising the Town Board that during the construction of Water District #2, the contractor, Caldwell Construction had removed property stakes along his property on Tanglewood Drive. Supervisor Stromecki directed the Town Clerk to forward this complaint to Edwards and Moncreiff for their investigation and to report back to the Town Board.

A motion was made by Councilman Kennedy and seconded by Councilman Zimmerman that the Highway bills in the amount of \$9,278.11 be paid. Carried five (5) ayes

A letter was read from Edwards & Moncreiff relative to a claim by James E. Schwabel on damage done to his property during rainstorms in July. The letter was received and filed.

A Notice of Claim In the Matter of James E. Schwabel vs Town of Boston, served upon Town Attorney Maxwell on October 28, 1976, was read by Town Clerk Klein. Town Attorney Maxwell stated this claim is pursuant to Section 51 of the General Municipal Law which is preliminary to the right to sue a municipality. He noted this claim is against the Town alone and not to be confused with the Caldwell situation as he claims the ditches along Hywood were not adequate to take the rain. Town Attorney Maxwell stated if you do nothing and a period of sixty (60) days passes it is considered denied and they then have a right to sue. At 8:00 P. M. a Public Hearing was held to consider the adoption of the 1977 Budget for the Town of Boston. The Legal Notice was read by the Town Clerk. Patricia Baubonis asked what items were covered under Personal Services and Supervisor Stromecki explained it included his salary, the salary of his Bookkeeper - Secretary. Town Clerk Klein explained that his Personal Services covers his salary and the salary of a secretary. Karen Kline asked what the reason was for the 50% increase in Water District #2. Supervisor Stromecki explained that last year money was expended for floating a loan and there was a partial assessment and this year there has to be money for debt reduction.

Mr. Gerald Seil of East Lane asked if there was any balance in Water District #1. Town Clerk Klein stated there was \$25,955.72 as of October 31, 1976. Mr. Seil asked that if there is a fund balance, why can't it be used against the budget. Supervisor Stromecki stated the reason is there is going to be an expansion of the District as there are people who have paid the full tax for years and have never received water. Therefore the capital balance that is in the fund will be used in addition to a minor tax increase of \$.43 per thousand. Mr. Seil asked if this had been passed by the Board. Supervisor Stromecki stated that the Board had recommended this expansion. Councilman Kennedy stated that a Public Hearing would be held before it is done. Councilman Kennedy stated that there should be some contingency and pointed out the need to repair the water line at Trevett Road a few years ago. It was also noted by Town Clerk Klein that at the end of the year payments will have to be made on the principal and interest on a loan on Water District #1 so the unexpended balance in Water District #1 will be much less than the \$25,000 figure that is presently in the account. Mr. Stromecki stated that Mr. Costello had given his stamp of approval as excellent and this is going to start us on the way for the \$415,000.00 loan at 5% from the FHA. Supervisor Stromecki stated there will be extensions on Water District #2 to some of the streets that have sufficient homes. He noted these are classified in the B-1 District which means they are in the District, but there is no water main in front of their home and they are paying a reduced tax. Supervisor Stromecki advised that the original estimate of Water District #2 costs was \$565,000 and the cost to complete the District was \$493,000.00 leaving a surplus and with this surplus the FHA has approved the go ahead for the expansion of the District. Supervisor Stromecki explained that due to sound fiscal management and proper consideration given to the farmers as they receive water and pay a general water tax as a resident would pay, the FHA has granted us ahead of time this loan and told the Town to go ahead with the construction. He further stated that the additional \$75,000.00 needed to do the expansion will be held up from the original grant of \$150,000.00. He stated the Town Engineer, Town Clerk and himself would be preparing the necessary papers tomorrow to apply for the loan.

A letter was received from Erie County Legislator Ronald Bennett to Supervisor Stromecki relative to snow removal contracts. The letter included a resolution by Mr. Bennett requesting that a surplus of \$1,000,000.00 in the Department of

Public Works be used for full funding of Snow Removal. Supervisor Stromecki stated that this would mean approximately \$1,000.00 more for the Town of Boston.

Supervisor Stromecki stated there will be work done in the future to up date or revise the Master Plan for the Town of Boston.

Supervisor Stromecki stated that engineering meetings will be held relative to the expansion of Water District #2 and also meetings will be held with the Town Board and Engineer on the expansion of Water District #1.

John Koza stated there was a problem on Back Creek Road with a ditch. Supervisor Stromecki stated he had talked to Mrs. Koza about this problem and he, Town Engineer Moncreiff and Mr. Caldwell have an appointment with the Erie County Department of Public Works to check this matter. Councilman Zimmerman stated that Mr. Galvin advised him that he had not received any complaints from private citizens stating that it was hard to see to get on to the ramp and Councilman Zimmerman stated that any letters sent would be in our favor and recommended the Town Board send a letter. The Town Clerk was directed to send a letter to Mr. Galvin on behalf of the Town Board giving our concern for the safety of the people making an entrance onto the Southern Expressway. Councilman Zimmerman stated Mr. Galvin had advised him that if there are enough complaints it is possible that the lighting could be included in the next section of the highway.

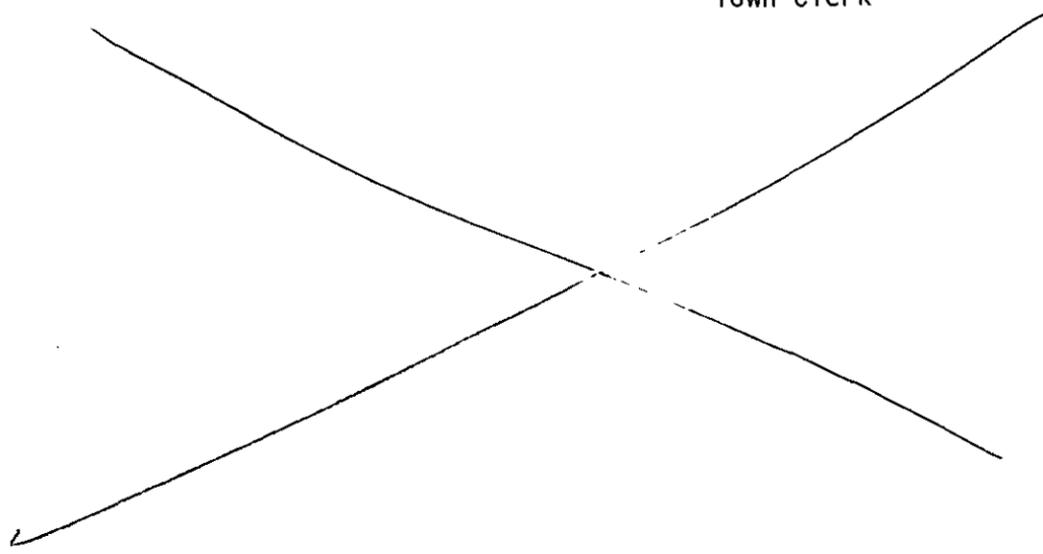

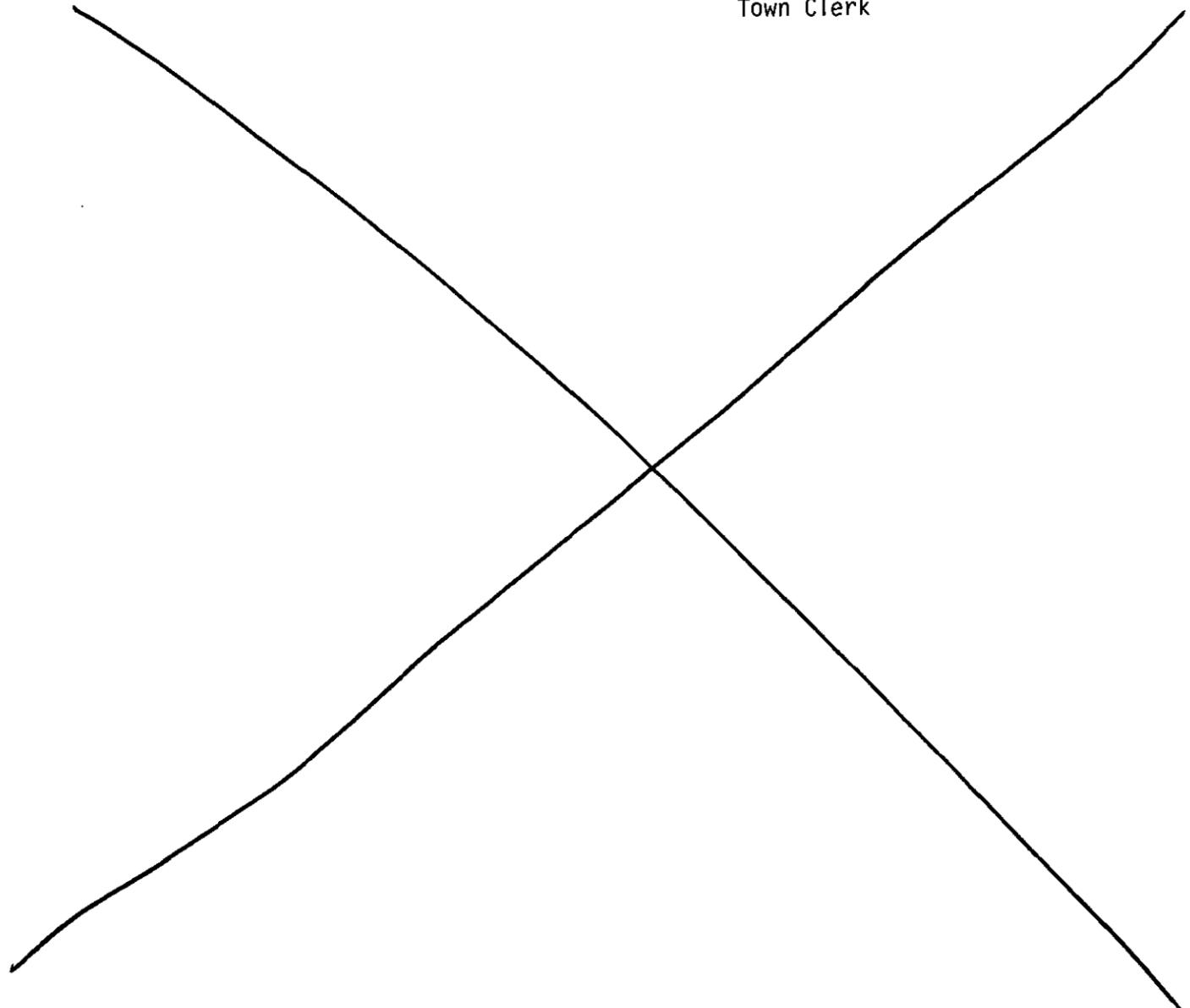

Section 1. The specific object or purpose for which the obligations are to be issued is payment of part of the cost of the purchase of one (1) 1976 John Deere 4 Wheel Loader, Model 544B, by the Town of Boston, New York.

Section 2. The maximum net estimated cost after trade-in allowance of such specific object or purpose is \$31,945.00 and the plan for the financing thereof is as follows:

- a) By the issuance of \$25,000 serial bonds of said Town, hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Finance Law and by the payment of the balance of said total cost in the amount of \$6,945.00 from current funds now available in the highway budget.

Section 3. It is hereby determined that the period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid specific object or purpose is at least 5 years, pursuant to subdivision 28 of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law. It is hereby further determined that the maximum maturity of the serial bonds herein authorized shall be five years.

Section 4. The faith and credit of said Town of Boston, Erie County, New York, are hereby irrevocably pledged to the payment of the principal of an interest on such bonds as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such bonds becoming due and payable in such year. There shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property within said Town of Boston a tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest on such bonds as the same become due and payable.

Section 5. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the serial bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Supervisor, the chief fiscal officer. Such notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Supervisor, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

Section 6. This resolution shall take effect immediately.

A motion was made by Councilman Zimmerman and seconded by Councilman Kennedy to enter into a contract with the Boston Emergency Squad in the amount of \$5,655.00 for 1977.

Supervisor Stromecki commended the Squad for the good job being done and stated that the costs involved are minute for the service we are getting.

The Board returned to the question of the request from the Trailer Court and after discussing whether the cottage is actually listed as a lot, it was decided to refer the matter to the Building Inspector for a recommendation and to the Town Attorney for a legal opinion.

A letter and Snow Contracts were received from the County of Erie. Also a letter was read advising that the Snow Contracts will be restored to the same status as the 1975-76 contract. Highway Superintendent Kreitzbender stated he had received notice of this restoration and they were plowing the specified areas. A motion was made by Supervisor Stromecki and seconded by Councilman Kennedy that the Town Board enter into a contract with the County of Erie to plow snow on designated County Highways at \$550 per lane mile upon the recommendation of Highway Superintendent Kreitzbender.

Councilman Kennedy asked if a report had been received from Town Engineer Moncreiff relative to his inspection of the bridge at Hillcroft. Supervisor Stromecki stated no and went on to say that it has been brought to the attention of the Board about water on Back Creek Road and he asked Highway Superintendent Kreitzbender to speak to Mr. Selmensberger, local engineer for the County, to see if something can be done by the County or collectively with the Town and County to get the water further north on Back Creek Road so it does not drop over the bank in the vicinity of the Subdivision and report at the next meeting. Supervisor Stromecki stated he hoped we would have a report from the Town Engineer by that time.

Councilman Kennedy stated that the Planning Board had asked him about the Flood Plain. Town Clerk Klein stated that his understanding is that we are waiting for the Federal Government to come forth with the next phase. Supervisor Stromecki stated that a couple of years ago Chris Luno and Town Engineer Moncreiff had reported on what could be done to alleviate the problems at the Colonial Drive Subdivision and he thought the cost was about \$60,000.00. Town Clerk Klein read a section of the Flood Plain regulations showing the steps that are to be taken.

Supervisor Stromecki asked that the matter of Colonial Drive Drainage problems be tabled until a report is received from Highway Superintendent Kreitzbender and Town Attorney Maxwell. Supervisor Stromecki directed the Town Clerk to send a memo to Town Attorney Maxwell requesting information on what has to be done further for the Flood Plain.

A notice of order was received from the New York State Department of Transportation advising that standing is prohibited as follows:

- (1) On the west side of Route 277, SH 1665, between Station E1 + 80+ (110+ feet south of the south pavement edge of Abbott Road) and Station E2+90+ (South pavement edge of Abbott Road), a distance of 110+.
- (2) On the east side of Route 277, SH 1665, between Station E1 + 30+ (160+ feet south of the south pavement edge of Abbott Road) and Station E2+90+ (south pavement edge of Abbott Road), a distance of 160+ feet.

Supervisor Stromecki directed the Town Clerk to send a letter to the Department of Transportation requesting the exact location of this restriction and then to advise any businesses that might be effected.

A letter was read from the New York State Department of Transportation in answer to the Board's letter of November 10, 1976 requesting a "Boston" sign on the Southern Expressway. Town Clerk Klein stated he did not agree with their letter and stated he would like to respond to their letter. The Town Clerk was directed to send a letter to the Department of Transportation and to express the feelings of the Board. He was also directed to send copies of the letter to our state representatives.

A letter was read from the New York State Department of Transportation relative to the Street Light proposal for Route 391 and 219. The letter from Town Clerk Klein to Mr. Galvin relative to this matter was also read. Supervisor Stromecki stated he would be meeting with Ken Joseph, Engineer on the Southern Expressway to try to get more delineators on the entrance to the Expressway and also a target date for the final inspection on the Expressway when it will be turned over to the State. Supervisor Stromecki stated that he feels after the state takes over the Expressway we will then be able to bargain with them for lighting. Town Clerk Klein asked why lights can't be put on the West side of Route 219 to replace those taken down. Supervisor Stromecki stated that the state will possibly be receptive to this idea. The letter was received and filed.

A letter plus a copy of the Town of Eden's TDR Section was received from the County of Erie. A notice of hearing was received from William A. Feasley, Supervisor of Eden relative to this matter. Supervisor Stromecki explained the purpose of the Public Hearing as a new concept in Zoning in the State. The Town Clerk was directed to make copies of the letter and attachments from the County for the Conservation Advisory Councilman and the Planning Board. The letters were received and filed.

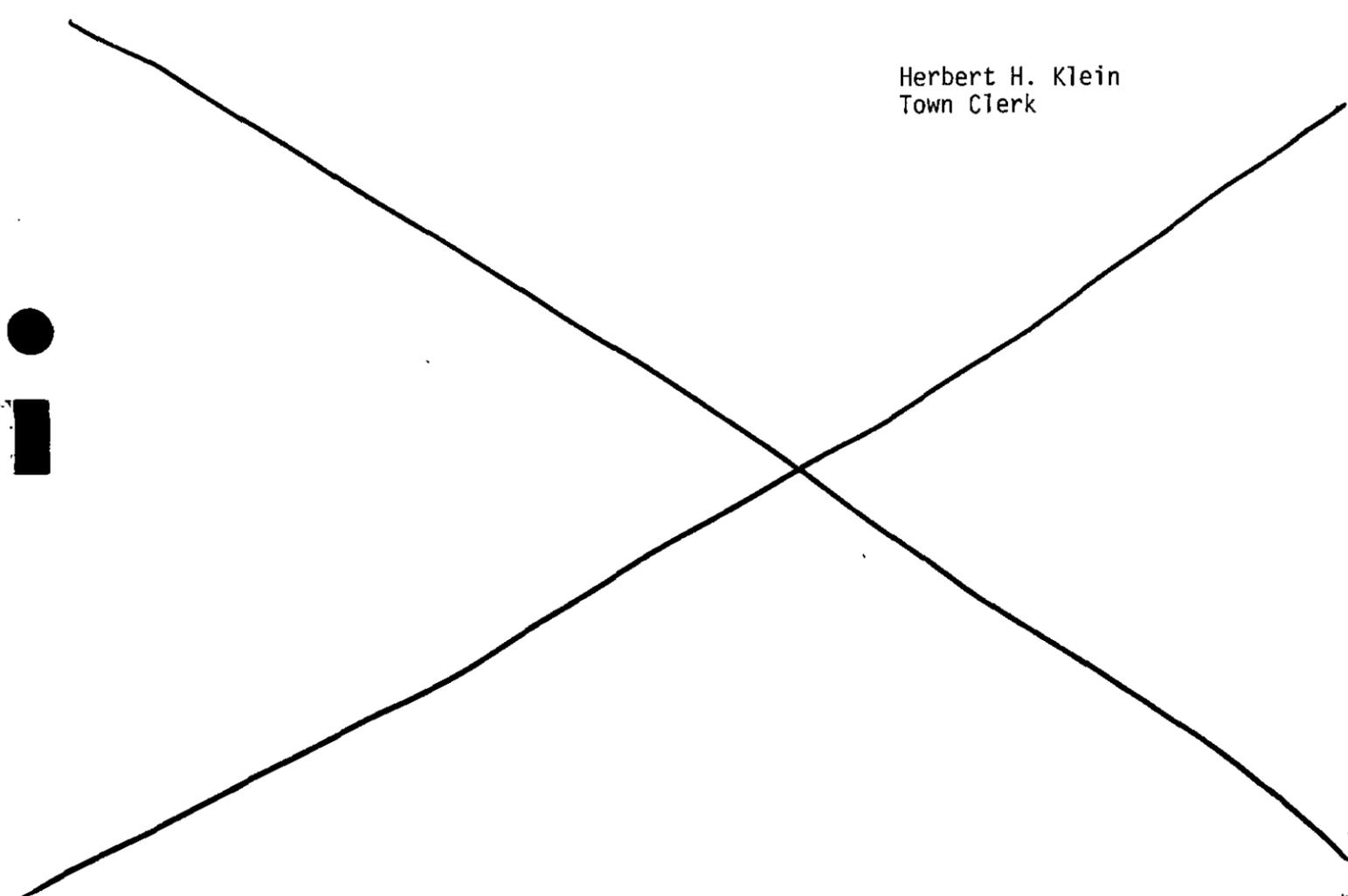

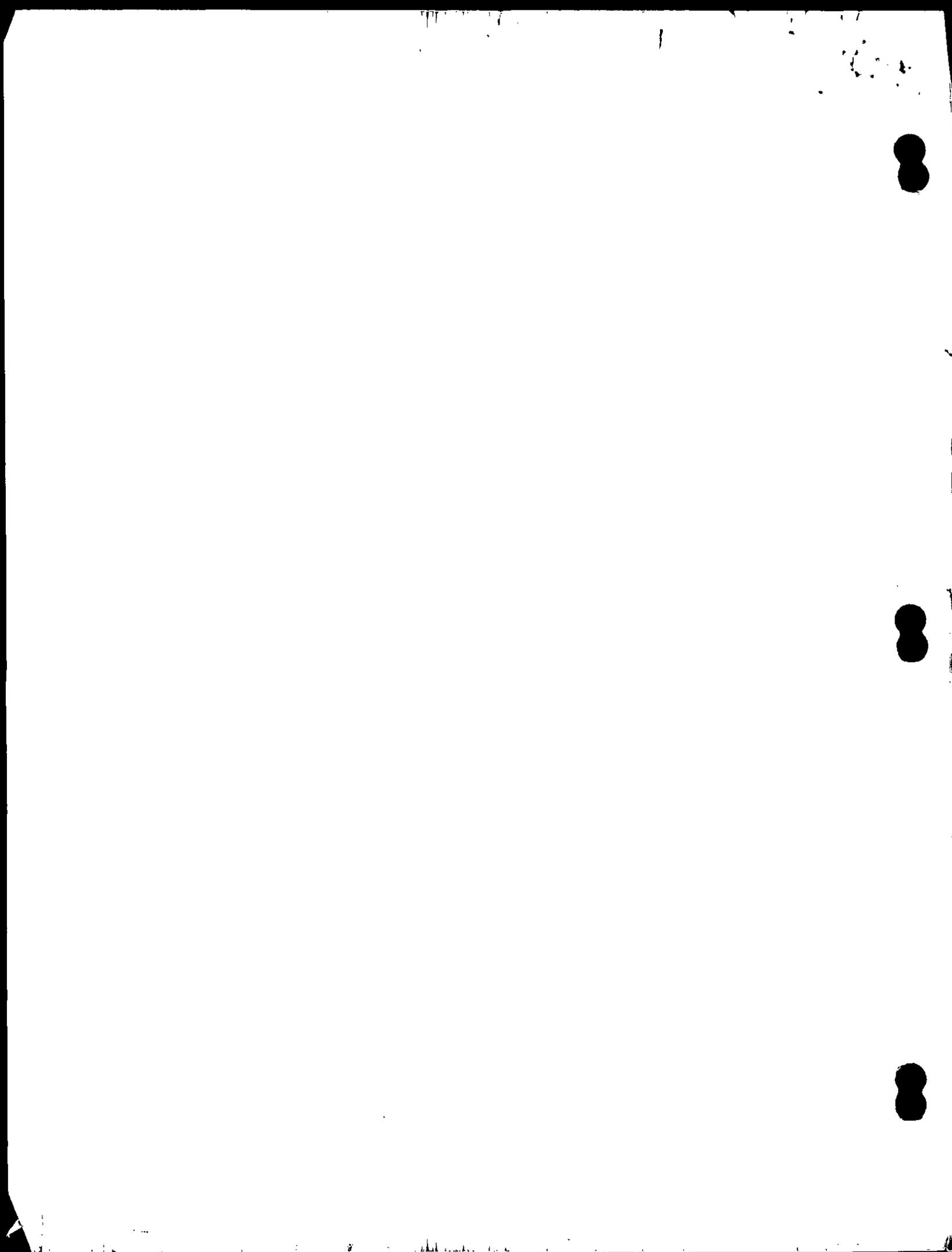

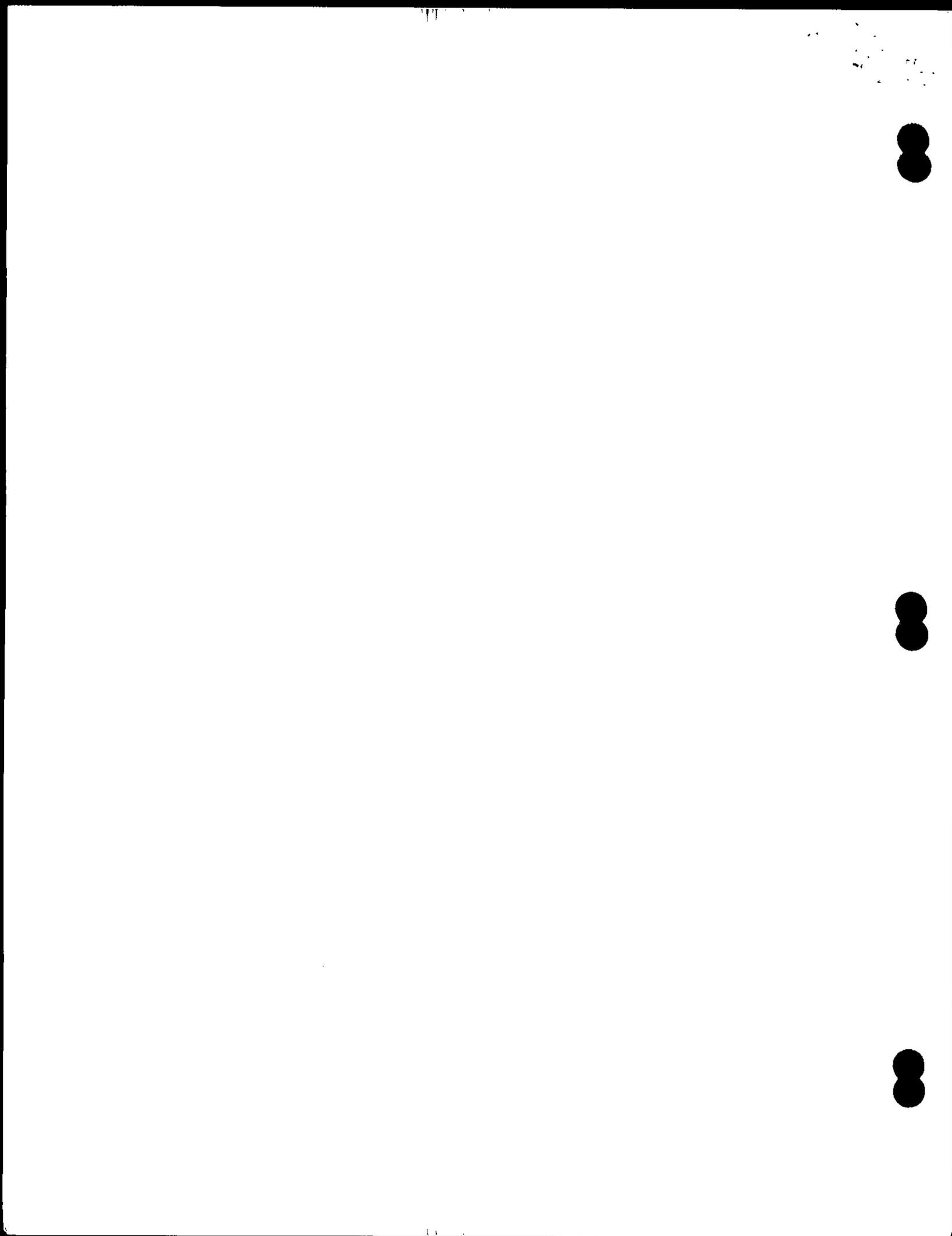

EXPLANATIONS

- (1) Taxes for these services must be levied on the area of the town outside villages:

Building Inspection (Section 138, Town Law)

Board of Health (Section 60, Town Law and Section 304 Public Health Law)

Registrar of Vital Statistics, except when combined districts coincide with a consolidated health district (Section 2124, Public Health Law)

Library (certain contract payments)(Section 256, Education Law)

Zoning and Planning (Section 261, Town Law)

- (2) Taxes for these services must be levied on the area of the town outside villages under the circumstances set forth below:

Police Department (Section 150, Town Law)

Town of Fallsburg, and towns in Suffolk County containing villages which maintain police departments with two or more full-time policemen. Department established after January 1, 1960: Town contains a village which maintains a police department of four or more policemen on an annual full-time basis.

Department established prior to January 1, 1960: Amounts in accordance with an agreement made between the town and a village within the town which maintains a full-time police department of four or more policemen.

Joint Police Department (General Municipal Law, Section 121-a)

Recreation (Article 13, General Municipal Law)

Amounts for parks, playgrounds and recreation centers established under the provisions of Article 13 of the General Municipal Law.

Refuse and Garbage (Section 120-v, General Municipal Law)

The share of the cost to be paid by the town in accordance with an agreement between the town and one or more villages for joint refuse and garbage collection and disposal, unless otherwise provided.

- (3) Revenues estimated to be received from any of the functions or activities for which taxes are levied in the town outside the village must be applied to the estimate of expenditures for such function or activity (Town Law, Section 112(1)).

Non-property tax distributed by a county must be credited to the town area outside of village if the village receives a cash distribution of non-property taxes from the county.
